Our 30 year legacy on family/friend caregiving

This year is our Centre's 30th anniversary. Throughout the past three Planning Guide for Family Caregivers decades our work has touched on many aspects of an aging population, generating knowledge to inform policy and practice. However, one consistent theme throughout this time has been the focus on family/friend caregiving. The role of family/friend caregivers is essential to our health and social care systems and to our commitment to supporting older Nova Scotians with care needs to remain at home. While caregiving can bring benefits and joy to some, what caregivers do, and the challenges they face in their role, can contribute to physical, financial and mental consequences. Support for caregivers is needed as is an ongoing understanding of how best to do that.

The Centre's foundation was built on the topic of caregiving in the early 90s, through the Care for the Caregiver (funded by Seniors' Independence Program, Health and Welfare Canada). This project was developed to provide social, physical and emotional support for those caring for older adults and introduced caregiver education and support workshops in Nova Scotia. Similar education and support initiatives continue today through the province's Caregivers Nova Scotia Association.

Throughout the years, our Centre led other important work to inform policy and practice on caregiving including: From Policy to People: Generating Systemic Support for Family Caregivers (1995-1997), Older Parents Caring for Adult Sons/Daughters with Disabilities: Age Related Transitions (1999-2001),

Where to Begin: An Introductory (2004-2005), A Profile of Caregivers in Nova Scotia (2008), Does Timing of Caregiving Assessment Make a Difference (2010-2013), Caregiver Supply and Demand (2010-2012), Financial Well Being of Caregivers-A Think Piece (2017). I also had the honour of being the Mount's Canada Research Chair in Aging and Caregiving Policy (2002-2012). During this time I had opportunity to contribute to several other caregiving projects nationally and internationally. All to say that advancing knowledge on caregiving to inform policy and practice has been a cornerstone of our work. However, the need for ongoing attention to family/friend caregiving has not subsided given that 28% of Nova Scotians provide 221 million hours of unpaid assistance (Statistics Canada 2018 General Social Survey).

Most recently, we are pleased to be working with Caregivers Nova Scotia on a strategic review of family/friend caregiving in Nova Scotia. This review. which involves hearing from family caregivers first hand as well as those working with them, will unveil the current landscape on the realities, experiences and needs of today's caregivers including a deeper understanding of the experiences of those from diverse racial and cultural backgrounds.

As we celebrate 30 years of generating knowledge to inform policy and practice, we look forward to building on our success and further our work on a number of topics, including family/friend caregivers. fance

At the Association's Annual General Meeting in June, NSCA staff shared highlights of their evaluation on the *Leaning into the Hard* program, a program aimed at supporting the mental health needs of staff working in long-term care, which was delivered to long-term care staff during winter of 2022. Their evaluation work highlighted areas in which the program was found to make a difference and noting challenges with implementing the program. This fall, the Association will be making the program available again to participating homes and NSCA continues its evaluation.

News from the Global Aging and Community Initiative



The Global Aging and Community

Initiative (GACI) is directed by Dr. Zachary Zimmer, Tier 1 Canada Research Chair, and is located within the Nova Scotia Centre on Aging.

 GACI hosted two international events. The "International Workshop on Health Expectancy: An Education, Training and Networking Opportunity for Early-Career Scholars," took place on Sept. 19-20 Assisted by funding from a SSHRC Connection grant, GACI was able to help fund the attendance of nine students. Following the workshop, GACI held the 33rd meeting of REVES (the International Network on Health Expectancies and the Disablement Process). It took place Sept. 21-23, 2022, at Dalhousie University.

· With funding from a CIHR Project grant, GACI coordinated the hiring of a post-doctoral fellow with expertise in biological aging to work on the project titled: "Long-term Effects of War on Health of Older Persons within a Rapidly Aging Population: The Case of Vietnam."

 In May 2022 Dr. Zachary Zimmer received MSVU's Award for Research Excellence. In May 2022 Dr. Zimmer also received a Health Surveys Research Award from IPUMS (Integrated Public Use Microdata Series).
