

STUDENT WORKS GUIDE – HOW TO APPLY

Student Works Fall/Winter 2025-26

[Student Works](#) is MSVU's largest on campus student employment program, intended to provide meaningful work for full-time students with financial need.

Check your eligibility

- Demonstrate financial need by completing the Student Works Budget Sheet
- Be a Mount student for the 2025/26 academic year and **registered** in 1.5 units in both the Fall and Winter terms (1.0 unit in each term if registered with Accessibility Services)
- If a domestic student, must have either a government student loan, sponsorship or bank funding (if applicable)
- Be living in Canada and available to work on campus
- Have a valid Canadian social insurance number and bank account
- Hold a valid study permit (if an international student)

How to apply

1. **Identify skills.** Identify 3 to 4 of your skills, strengths, or applicable lived experiences that can apply to the workplace. You can draw on volunteer experiences, past jobs, academic assignments, travel, interests, or any other applicable experience.
2. **Login to the platform.** Login to [Career Connects](#) with your MSVU email address and regular password. Go to the Careers tab and look for Job Postings.
3. **Review job postings.** Pick out a handful of job postings that generally match your skills, strengths, or lived experiences.
4. **Review the cover letter and resume in this guide.** See visual examples below. You will use one cover letter and one resume to apply. Your goal is to generally align with the job postings you've chosen to apply to. The key is to focus on showing what you're good at, rather than trying to address every keyword or requirement in the job postings.
5. **Prepare your email application.** Send your [budget sheet](#), cover letter, and resume to financial.aid@msvu.ca before Friday, September 19 at 12 p.m. noon.

PARAGRAPH 1. Introduce yourself. Options: year of study, program, philosophy ("I like to think about how..."), a short list of high-level skills, strengths, or applicable lived experiences. This will help you set up the next paragraphs where you will show more detail around the 3 to 4 skills/strengths/lived experiences you want departments to know about. Your goal is to generally align with the job postings you've chosen to apply to. The key is to focus what you're good at, rather than trying to address every keyword or requirement in the job postings.

PARAGRAPHS 2 TO 4. Define each of your skills/strengths/lived experiences in separate paragraphs. Center each paragraph around one main experience (you can include brief mentions of other areas where you developed the skill). Use the paragraphs to explain how you earned the skill or came to understand your strength or lived experience. Notice that by outlining the process of the interviews in the first paragraph, this student also demonstrates their secondary skills of organization and time management.

As a second year student completing a Bachelor of Arts degree with a major in Sociology, I like to think about how communication and gatherings motivate people. I enjoy communicating with others, event planning, learning new technology, and volunteering on and off campus. Below are a few highlights of my skills, strengths, and lived experiences I would like to offer in a professional capacity to your department.

Communication – I've developed most of my written and verbal communication skills through class assignments, presentations, and volunteering at The Halifax Helpers, where I was responsible for interviewing potential tutors and matching them with families waiting for learning support. This volunteer experience taught me to spend time asking tutors and families about their requirements and to create tutor/family pairings, based on subject, time availability, and neurodivergent learning styles for the senior team to review.

Event planning – This past year, I helped organize a summer family reunion in Halifax, our largest to date. Over 70 people traveled across Canada and the United States to attend. My role in this event was to research group rates for hotel accommodations and to keep track of dietary needs for catering orders. For fun, I also set up a beach-themed photo booth, which was a big hit.

Social media and design platforms – While I have working knowledge of CapCut that I'm always looking to upgrade with tutorials, I am more at home with Canva and Instagram. In the spring, for example, I designed a series of Instagram polls for the Sociology Society that led to clear member voting outcomes for our society's activities in 2025-26.
