Job Application Tips for Students

The Interview

You have landed the interview but the hard work is yet to be done... preparing for the interview. Have no fear! These tips will help you get through the process and end up with a great result.



Do your research on the organization

When you are called for an interview make sure you do your research on the organization. Knowing who you will potentially be working for is a key component to a successful interview.

Bring samples of your work to the job interview

Start saving your class assignments on a USB or flash drive. Your work from past classes are a great resource for your interviews and will help show off your talent and skill set. Even if a piece isn't directly related to the job description, bring it anyway. You never know where the conversation might lead!

Make a good first impression and don't be late!

Be punctual and show up 15 minutes before the interview. This will give a really good first impression, which is crucial to a job interview. Remember that employers will be able to tell what kind of person you are, right from the moment you walk through the door. It's really important to remain professional at all times.

Practice mock interview questions with family members or friends

Another fantastic way to prepare is to look over potential interview questions with a family member, a friend or a co-op office employee. Make sure you can practice your answers so that you are well organized and ready for the interview.

Dress professionally

Always remember to dress professionally and in a clean, conservative manner. In other words, don't wear something that you would wear out with your friends on a Friday night. Making a good first impression is very important, and dressing professionally is a step in that direction.

There's no need to be nervous

Going to an interview, might give you the jitters, but remember that the employer is probably nervous as well. Think of the interview as a discussion between two people and you will be fine.

Tips for On the Job

Take risks and learn from your mistakes

Everything with co-op is a learning experience. Mistakes happen, and you have to be willing to learn from them. Be prepared to take risks and learn new things.

Network and socialize

Go out for lunch with your co-workers and take on extra projects and tasks at the office. It will give you lots of hands-on experience. Who knows? It could lead to another job opportunity in the future.

Ask questions, all the time

Always ask questions. If you don't understand something, ask for help. There is no such thing as a dumb question, only a dumb answer.

Working a new job is not just about making money and learning new things. It's about having fun too. You only live once, so Carpe Diem!



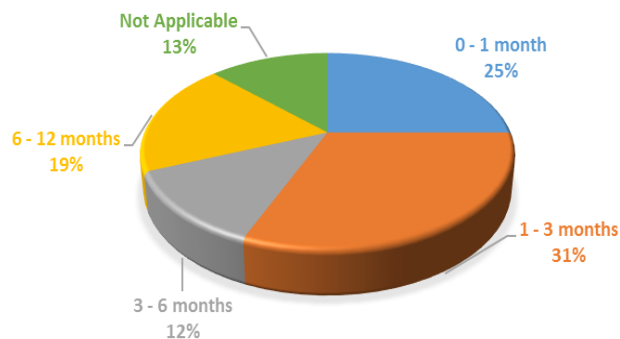

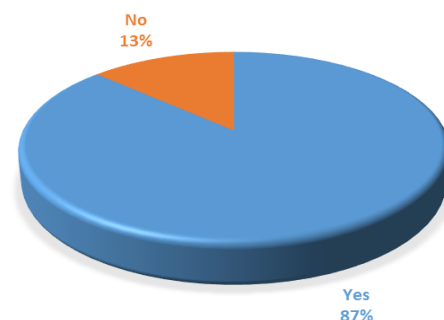
May 2013 Grads Survey Summary

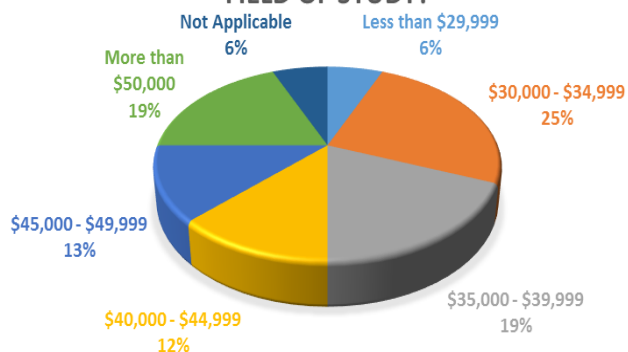
HOW LONG DID IT TAKE YOU TO SECURE EMPLOYMENT AFTER GRADUATION?



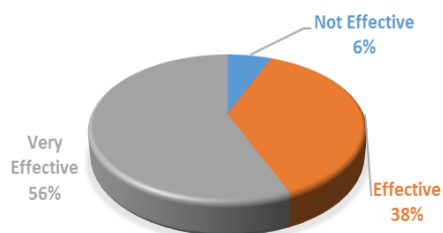
ARE YOU CURRENTLY EMPLOYED IN YOUR FIELD OF STUDY?



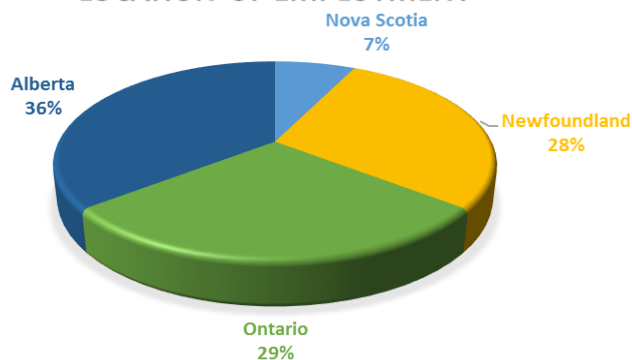
WHAT WAS YOUR STARTING SALARY IN YOUR FIELD OF STUDY?



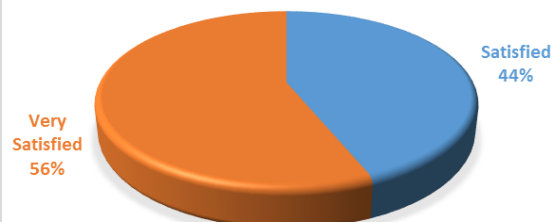
HOW EFFECTIVE WAS CO-OPERATIVE EDUCATION IN SECURING A FULL-TIME POSITION AFTER GRADUATION?

OVERALL, HOW SATISFIED WERE YOU WITH YOUR CO-OP EXPERIENCE?



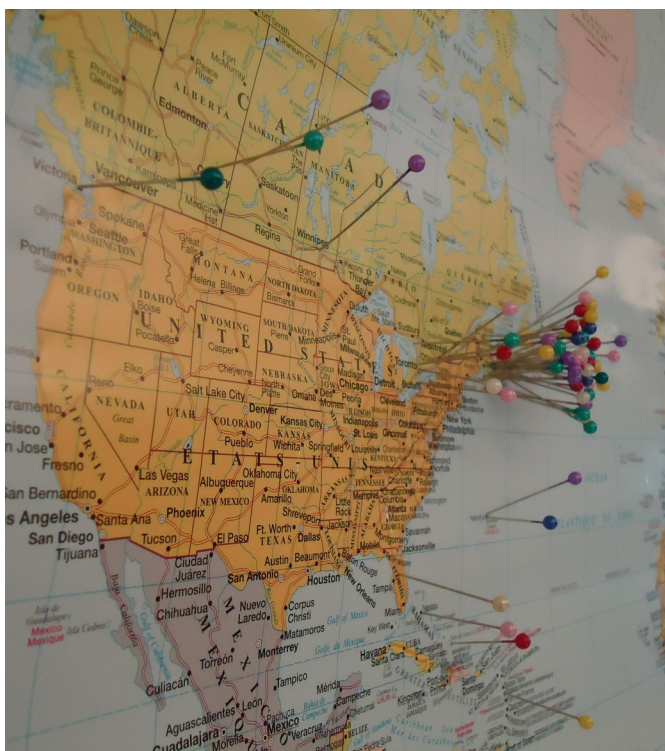
Flexible Learning with Online Courses

The Department of Business and Tourism was the first to embrace “computer-based learning”, as it was called in the early 1990s, and has been in the forefront of online teaching at the Mount ever since. In the past academic year, BUSI courses alone accounted for over 30% of the total online courses offered.

In addition to the BBA degree and many components of the BTHM, certificates in Accounting, Business Administration, Marketing, and Tourism, and diplomas in Business Administration and Tourism can be completed via distance modes. Most courses involve independent work on Moodle and weekly seminars in real time using Blackboard Collaborate (think Skype for groups). Some courses, especially electives in arts, include video lectures.

Whether you are living far from the Mount campus, balancing family demands, committed to sports training and teams, working irregular schedules, travelling for your job, out on a co-op term, or just looking for more control of your schedule, online learning provides the flexibility you need to meet your educational goals.



Here are a few tips and updates to make your online learning experience enjoyable:

1. Check out the resources available on the new Distance Learning and Continuing Education website at www.msvu.ca/distance. From links on this page you can find out about online course offerings and the main technologies you will use.
2. Order your textbooks and other materials via the online bookstore link at the page above. The online bookstore is now managed by the campus Bookstore in Rosaria, so that is where you can pick up your order (or have it shipped).
3. Keep in mind that a computer with a wired connection is still the most reliable way to use Moodle and Collaborate. Wireless connections may result in delayed Moodle performance and choppy Collaborate sessions. As well, it is not advisable to rely solely on a tablet or mobile device, since they may not support full functionality or give you stable connectivity.
4. To make the most of your course, use the available resources and participate actively in Collaborate sessions. Check your Mount e-mail daily and stay connected with your professor and your classmates.
5. If you need help with Moodle or Collaborate, be sure to contact Distance Learning staff at online@msvu.ca or come to Room 106 EMF during office hours. Check out the detailed information at www.msvu.ca/moodle.

Business Administration Student & Competitive Athlete

After high school I took a year off to focus on making the 2008 Olympic games in Beijing in the sport of sprint kayaking. Narrowly missing out on a spot, I wasn't ready to give up on my dream, but decided to pursue a Bachelor of Business Administration, with a major in marketing at MSVU. Learning that MSVU offered the program via distance, I knew it was the right fit for me with my busy schedule.



I started paddling when I was 13 years old at the Cheema Aquatic Club in Waverley, Nova Scotia. With a dream of going to the Olympics, it was fitting to start kayaking since the club had just sent several athletes to the 2000 Sydney Olympics such as Karen Furneaux.

I quickly made big gains in the sport. In 2005, at the age of 16, I made my first Junior World Championships that were held in Hungary. Two years later, I went to Czech Republic to compete at the junior world championships again where I won a silver medal in the K2 500m. It was the first ever crew boat medal Canada had won at these championships.



By this time I had graduated high school and was thinking about my post secondary education. I was still working on my dream of making the Olympics one day and had to make a decision that was going to allow me to keep putting in the full focus and time I needed to reach this dream.

A teammate of mine went to the Mount and had told me about the distance program and how it would give me the freedom I needed to paddle. To add to that, I knew I wanted to do my studies in marketing, so MSVU was the perfect fit for my needs.

Since starting my studies at the Mount in 2009, I have competed and medaled at multiple world cups and the 2011 Pan American Games in Mexico. I have also competed at the World Championships and just missed out on making the 2012 London Olympic Games by 0.6 seconds in the K2 200m event.

I am so grateful that MSVU has given me the opportunity to pursue my post-secondary education while chasing my Olympic dreams. It is going to take me a little longer than it would for a typical student to complete their degree, but along with my family and friends, I feel that the Mount is an important part of my success.



The Life of a Business Professor

It was a life changing experience that got Dr. Gabrielle (Gabie) Durepos where she is today. Sitting in her undergraduate classes at Mount Allison University, she never thought she could become an educator. All of her professors were older men, but she had one young female professor who was in her late twenties. She was hip, vibrant and had really nice outfits, and she changed Gabie's outlook on life.

"It had never occurred to me that I could be a professor, until I met her" Dr. Durepos stated, "I thought to myself that I could do that too. I could be standing in front of a business class teaching". She lets out a small giggle. "She was a really big changer for me" she adds, "For the first time I thought that I could actually go down that career path and be successful".

With the help of her key life mentors, she was able to accomplish that goal. Her entire family, including her mother, father, brother and sister, supported her every step of the way. When at Saint Mary's University, her PhD supervisor, Albert Mills was a huge mentor and supporter of her research in Organizational History. To this day he is still one of her greatest mentors and friend.

Her hard work and determination has certainly paid off. Dr. Gabrielle Durepos is now an Assistant Professor in the Department of Business and Tourism at the Mount. In the fall she will teach Business Communication, as well as being involved with her service level work, and research.



She was drawn to Halifax because it would bring her closer to her research. She loves the Mount and that the small classroom sizes will help her connect really well with her students.

"You can't do that with 150 students, but you absolutely can with an average class size of 24" she says. She also loves the small campus environment, and the Mount's strong tradition women's studies. In other words, this school is her perfect fit!

When asked what she does on a daily basis, she laughs. "There is never one day of my life that has been the same" she says, "I have a habit of getting involved with committees and I love to feel connected with those with whom I work."

Despite taking on various tasks, she tries to remain organized with a tentative daily routine, including class preparation, teaching and meetings. With such a busy life, she continues to stay inspired by small wins and successes.

"It's the little things that make me so happy" she says, "Positive feedback is what keeps me going and to think I actually helped someone really gives me a sense of purpose."

Her personal life goal, which is to be happy and help others, is what really adds the icing to the cake. It's a simple, yet complex life goal. What makes her really happy is being able to teach.

"I don't know what else I would ever do", she said. "Being an educator isn't an occupation to me, it's an identity. It's what I do and it's who I am".

She loves her students and she really encourages them to "be curious, ask questions, and talk to professors. It's so much easier and more fun when you know your Profs and they know you" she says.

If it hadn't been for her life changing experience during her undergraduate degree, Dr. Durepos doesn't know where she would be today. She talked to her young female professor and really got to know her well. Gabie learned an important lesson from that professor that year, which was to work really hard and strive for success. Dr. Durepos' future is looking very bright, as she continues every day to reach for the stars.
