Social Enterprise for a Day (SE4D) is a new collaborative initiative from the Centre for Entrepreneurship Education & Development (CEED), Mount Saint Vincent University (MSVU), and the Norman Newman Centre for Entrepreneurship at Dalhousie University. Students from MSVU, Dalhousie, Nova Scotia Community College, and Halifax Regional Municipality high schools created and implemented a social enterprise over the course of one weekend.(February 3rd &4th)

Volunteers from local agencies, social enterprises, and educational institutions teamed up with students to help create each social enterprise idea and assisted in the implementation of the ideas.



Ben Barry is the founder and CEO of the Toronto-based Ben Barry Agency was our keynote speaker. His company is the world leader in scouting and sourcing models of all sizes, ages, colors and abilities for international fashion and beauty brands. He is also the author of bestseller Fashioning Reality: A New Generation of Entrepreneurship and the first male winner of the Governor General's Award in Commemoration of the Persons Case for advancing the equality of women. He has been featured in the Wall Street Journal and Globe and Mail and on Oprah and Fashion Television. Ben holds an Honors Bachelor of Arts in Women's Studies from the University of Toronto, and a Masters' in Innovation and Strategy from Judge Business School at Cambridge University. He is currently a Ph.D Student at Judge Business School. Ben serves on the Board of Directors for the Canadian Foundation of Women's Health and is Chair of the Toronto Fashion Incubator.

Mr. Barry's keynote speech was passionate and relevant and inspired students to make the most of the time they had on the weekend to develop and implement their own social enterprise ideas.

Caritas Day 2012: A Great Event Grows Bigger

On January 25th the Mount celebrated Caritas Day, a day of caring founded by the Sisters of Charity. In 1951, after a devastating fire destroyed Mount Saint Vincent College, the surrounding community reached out to help the Mount. The actions of the community inspired Caritas Day and it remains a day on which students are encouraged to give back to the community through volunteerism.

The Department of Business and Tourism partnered with the Sisters of Charity to organize a series of activities throughout the morning, with students, staff and faculty taking part. The event began with a free volunteer breakfast and some encouraging words from the Department Chair and Associate Professor, Dr. Peter Mombourquette; Vice President Academic, Dr. Elizabeth Church; and Community Leader (Caritas Residence), Sister Helen Danahy.

A number of students volunteered with the Sisters of Charity to prepare food for the Out of the Cold homeless shelter in Halifax, a shelter which receives meals from the Sisters each week. Another group of students participated in workshops to discuss volunteerism and its effect on the community. Led by the Sisters of Charity, the workshops provided a better understanding of the types of work they're involved with. The remaining students paired with Mount faculty and staff to collect non-perishable food items in a community food drive. As students knocked on the doors of many Mount neighbours in Halifax, Clayton Park and Bedford, the response and generosity was overwhelming. As a result, shelves of the Mount Food Resource Centre are stocked for the winter term - an accomplishment that will help to ensure no student goes hungry.

Volunteers ended their day of giving with lunch and a brief address from Sister Evelyn Williams, Director of Seton Spirituality Centre. "It was heartwarming for me to see the values and spirit of the Mount's tradition alive and active in the faculty and students who were part of Caritas Day." said Sister Evelyn Williams.

Caritas Day was deemed a success - not because a specific number of bags of food were collected or sandwiches made, but because spirit and pride resulted from being part of something that gave back to the community. Melissa Gerrow, co-op student with the Department of Business and Tourism and project coordinator for the event, felt an added sense of pride after yesterday's event. "Seeing the efforts made by volunteers made me feel lucky and proud to be part of the Mount community. I left feeling confident in that even one seemingly small deed can make a big impact."



\$2.25 Million Closer to a New Building

On February 9th more than 250 students, faculty, staff, alumnae and University friends gathered to find out "the secret" as it was so cleverly promoted, that the Mount was about to receive the largest donation in its history. Mrs. Margaret McCain announced a donation of \$2.25 million to Mount Saint Vincent University and was met with an overwhelming response from the crowd.

These new funds will go toward the efforts of building a new building that will be rightfully named the Margaret Norrie McCain Centre for Teaching, Learning, and Research. The building will not only provide new learning labs, classrooms, and interactive and collaborative technology but it will also honor women in various spaces throughout the building, such as the women's wall of honor.

Project TWENTY12 is a collaboration of influential and committed leaders to reach the \$12 million goal set out for the construction of a new building. Over 50 community volunteers currently serve on fundraising committees for the project. No new classroom facilities have been constructed since 1971 and developing more efficient areas for learning is considered a high priority to those involved with the University. Project TWENTY12 is set to conclude the fundraising efforts at the end of the year and start breaking ground on the building in 2013.







Yarmouth Trip for Tourism Students

Fourth year students went on a field trip Feb 10 & 11th to meet with tourism people in Yarmouth. The purpose of the trip was to gather information on Yarmouth as a destination and to create ideas to help Yarmouth attract more tourists. The past few years have not been kind to the people of Yarmouth with the ferry system to the US stopped in 2009. The ferry system did help by putting customers on the doorsteps of the businesses in Yarmouth. Now that has stopped and businesses have to promote themselves.

The students met with a number of movers and shakers in tourism such as Wayne Hamilton, Group sales for Yarmouth, Denise Nickerson, who manages the historic Cape Forchu Lightstation

(http://www.capeforchulight.com/) and who also wears another hat as General Manager of Yarmouth & Acadian Shores Tourism Association. The visit included a wonderful lobster dinner (of course) and the students attended an auction to raise funds for the Mariners Junior A Hockey Team. Yarmouth will be hosting the World Junior A Hockey Challenge this November and Yarmouth is certainly a hockey town. A visit to the Mariners Center (http://www.mariners-centre.com/) really showed how important hockey is to Yarmouth with over 400 children playing different levels of hockey.

Their visit also included a trip to the Farmers Market (<u>www.yarmouthfarmersmarket.com</u>) on Saturday morning where they were introduced to more members of the community, sampled some coffee and pastries, did a little shopping and chatted with the mayor. They also met the person responsible for managing the market, a young lady named Ingrid. This course project on Yarmouth is part of a fourth year course, THMT 4406 Destination Development. Every year a community is approached to partner with the students. The course covers tourism development and how tourist destinations can create facilities and services to meet the needs of tourists. This year poses a significant situation due to the many challenges destinations such as Yarmouth are facing with decreased tourists visitations. Challenges include the current economic environment, increased gasoline prices, and the low market prices for lobster. The lobster fishery is a mainstay in Yarmouth. In spite of the challenges, the students are confident they can give recommendations that can help Yarmouth look attractive as a destination.

The project includes a tourism audit on the inventory of tourism attractions and services in the Yarmouth area. Students will also give suggestions about how to increase visitations. The project culminates with a written report that will be given to Yarmouth as well a presentation that will be given live, as well as virtually, via the use of Collaborate. Invitations will be sent out to stakeholders in the tourism industry including provincial and municipal representatives. The exciting part of the presentation is that Mayor Moody of Yarmouth is threatening to attend.

FAFU- Mount Welcomes Students from Tier 1 University in China

If the Fujian Agriculture and Forestry University (FAFU) were a city in Nova Scotia it would be the province's second largest after Halifax. Over 40,000 students live on the university's beautiful campus in Fuzhou on the south east coast of China. For the last five years students from FAFU have formed the largest international student group at the Nova Scotia Agricultural College (NSAC) as part of a 2+2 agreement between the two institutions. Students entering FAFU's Overseas Education College choose their program knowing they will spend two years studying in China and finish their degree with two years at a partner institution overseas.

In the fall of 2011, MSVU welcomed its first students from FAFU. Our relationship is set to expand with the signing of a 2+2 agreement with FAFU that will initially cover our BBA, BTHM and BSc (AHN) degrees. As part of this agreement MSVU has also agreed to exchanges of faculty with FAFU and the development of bilingual (English-Chinese) courses that will be part of the curriculum at FAFU.

The first bilingual course will be an introductory marketing course developed by Prof. Michael Whalen of MSVU and Profs. Junling He and Wei Dong from FAFU. The course will be taught for the first time in April of this year and other courses will follow as the relationship develops between the universities.

The Mount looks forward to welcoming more students from FAFU in 2012 as well as visits from the faculty and staff of our new partner.







Dr. Sandi Findlay-Thompson is a faculty member in the Department of Business Administration and Tourism & Hospitality Management. She completed her BBA at MSVU, her MBA at Dalhousie University, and her Ph.D. in Business (Management) at Northcentral University. Sandi worked for 27 years in industry, holding management positions in the legal, marketing, and financial services sectors. In 1990 she had a chance encounter with then President of MSVU, Dr. Margaret Fulton, who encouraged her to apply to the Mount as a part-time lecturer. Sandi followed this advice and realized immediately that teaching ignited a passion she wanted to pursue. Sandi is the Chair of the Advisory and Management Boards for the Centre for Women in Business, the only university business development centre in Canada focused solely on women entrepreneurship. Mount students have many opportunities to work with the members of the Centre to develop business plans and hone their entrepreneurial skills and Sandi invites all students to visit the Centre during their time here at the Mount.

In the class, Sandi finds the life experiences that students bring to the classroom to be an effective learning device and encourages students to share their experiences and knowledge with each other. She also expects students to analyze the theoretical learning that takes place within the classroom and to ask "how can this be applied in the real world?" She is able to connect with students because of her vast industry experience and students appreciate the reality of her teaching style.

As the liaison for Bermuda College students, Sandi has developed a respected relationship with students especially those who remain in Bermuda and study with the Mount via distance learning. She works closely with students from Bermuda who have completed their Associates degree at Bermuda College and who have registered with MSVU to complete a BBA. In her role as liaison, she ensures that each student has access to her both as an academic advisor and as a faculty contact here in Halifax.

As a researcher, Sandi's interests lie in the area of non-profit management, women entrepreneurship, and managerial competencies in different industries. She is currently working on several research projects.

On a personal level, Sandi is a graduate of the Mount's BBA program. She is married to Bruce Thompson, also a graduate of the Mount's BBA program, and has three adult children, Rick, Travis, and Brittany. She says she has raised three very independent children who are not afraid to voice their opinions and that conversations around their dinner table are loud and boisterous! Paying for my education was a great motivator to keep me focused in my classes because I knew the dollar amount on the line and just how many hours I had to work to pay for just one course.

I knew I wanted to get my degree in Business Administration with a major in marketing because that just seemed to fit my personality. I wanted a degree that I could use after graduation and by combining a marketing degree with my Digital Media Design diploma; I felt this could give me an edge on the competition. Since I had worked between college and university I knew how competitive the job market could be and I believe taking this time between has really benefited me. During my first year, I discovered the Mount's Co-op Education Program and quickly applied. This program was another that pushed me to be better. The summer of my third year I landed a six month internship at Nanos Research in Ottawa, ON. This was an amazing opportunity to work directly with the company's president in the head office and work in the marketing field for a company that is a leader in the industry. Due to the Mount's flexible distance courses I was able to take advantage of this opportunity while continuing to work on getting my degree. At the Mount I was never stuck choosing between one opportunity and the next. This is just another great example of how the Mount is there for their students. I have truly appreciated all of the support and guidance that was provided to me over the course of my time here. When I graduate, it will not be easy to say goodbye but I am excited and motivated to write the next chapter in my life.
