

Selling Sex in Heaven

In addition to chairing the Mount's Department of Women's Studies, Dr. Meredith Ralston is also an award-winning film maker.

During a five-year development project in the Philippines, Ralston met Mila and felt compelled to depict her story on film. Mila works at Heaven, a little bar in Angeles City, the Philippines. Formerly the site of a US Air Force Base, the city is now one of the busiest and sleaziest sex tourist destinations in Southeast Asia.

In the Philippines, prostitution is not just a lucrative business – it's an industry. The documentary examines the country's sex trade and the young women it traps. Seen through the eyes of two idealistic female Canadian university students and Dr. Stephen Perrott of MSVU'S Department of Psychology, Ralston follows two years of Mila's life and the people who befriend her.

The project was funded by the Canadian International Development Agency (CIDA's AUCC TIER 2 UPCD Programme) in cooperation with MSVU and Saint Mary's University.

Narrated by actor Kiefer Sutherland, the film had its world debut on the CBC Newsworld program *The Lens* on January 16, 2007 with outstanding ratings. *Selling Sex in Heaven* won the Jury Award for Best Documentary at the 2005 Big Bear Lake International Film Festival in California and was featured at the Atlantic Film Festival in September of 2005.

This success has prompted Ralston to explore other ways to tell the stories of sex workers like Mila. She is developing either a feature film or television mini-series on this problem that exploits women,

as well as men and children, around the world.



Honouring O'Neill

The wife of the late Dr. Patrick O'Neill, Dianne O'Neill, has made a tremendous and fitting donation to the MSVU Library in her husband's memory.

In May of 2006, she gave the Library materials related to O'Neill's research in theatre as well as his work at MSVU. The collection includes research correspondence, research notes, newspaper clippings and transcriptions, course materials and copies of most of his publications.

O'Neill, a thirty-year faculty member, was MSVU's former Director of Research and a dedicated member of the Mount community. He passed away suddenly in April of 2006. O'Neill made a significant contribution to national heritage as a leading scholar in Canadian theatre history.

A significant portion of the collection consists of O'Neill's Halifax Theatre Newspaper Project. The Project encompasses resources beginning with the founding of Halifax in 1749 up to 2005.

I know that the MSVU Archives will give the collection the attention and profile it deserves. We look forward to working with visiting scholars from across Canada and beyond, both in person and electronically, as they explore this rich content."

This Summer at the Art Gallery

This summer, the MSVU Art Gallery will offer visitors the opportunity to learn more about contemporary visual art from near and far.

Showing from June 16 - August 12, Elegies and Effigies (Material Remains) brings together artists from across Nova Scotia who work in a variety of media. This exhibition focuses on art that emphasizes the traces of things impressions left in paint, marks left on the sea bed, fading flowers and beach combings - works when presented together produce a nuanced, poetic impression.

The show highlights the aesthetic ideas and technical accomplishment of

artists who, as often as not, work in considerable isolation from one another.

Rising star Micah Lexier will visit from New York as the Guest Curator to showcase work by three of his favourite contemporary artists. From June 23 -September 16, the Gallery will feature For Example, an exquisite compilation of works by the three artists. Works by Kim Moodie (a teeming, edge-to-edge drawing), Jeannie Thib (stacked and composed felt shapes) and Joy Walker (silk screened cloth) will be housed in their own vitrines and may be viewed from above, instead of in the traditional, wall-mounted fashion.

History Making Season for

MSVU Mystics

This was a record-setting year for MSVU varsity sports. Both the women's and men's basketball teams were undefeated all season – a first for each and consequently secured their ACAA Championships. Also winning the ACAA Championship was the men's soccer team, which was only formed three years ago.

Mystic athletes also set records for individual awards with 18 varsity athletes capturing All Conference honours, two league MVPs, two all-Canadians and two winners of the ACAA rookie of the year award. Our Coaches were also recognized by the ACAA for their outstanding contributions. Coaches of the Year were James Sawler (men's soccer), Rick Plato (men's basketball) and Dyrick McDermott (women's basketball).

Congratulations also goes out to the women's volleyball and soccer teams who finished in third and fourth place respectively in the ACAA rankings.

The fall season already promises to be just as exciting with MSVU hosting the 2007-08 CCAA National Soccer Championships for both women and men in November.

Focus on Research

for the MSVU Community and Beyond

With each academic year, the Mount is solidifying its position as a leader in academic research. Benefiting students, faculty, the University and the greater community, the work happening on campus has far-reaching meaning and applications. The efforts of MSVU researchers are translating into and impacting on policy in a variety of fields. And it's being noticed.

External research funding has increased almost four-fold to approximately \$4 million in newly funded research per year. For example, between 2004 and 2006, MSVU faculty members won over

\$500,000 in Natural Sciences and Engineering Research Council of Canada awards and over \$300,000 in awards from the Canadian Institutes of Health Research (CIHR).

Members of the University faculty have also been extremely successful in securing infrastructure funding from the Canadian Foundation for Innovation (CFI). State-of-the-art research facilities are instrumental in attracting and retaining top students and faculty. The Technology Learning Research Centre is one such example of how faculty's efforts to secure CFI funding have enhanced the campus.

SIMergency to the Rescue

It seems more and more we hear stories of large-scale emergencies that involve a multi-tiered response. Training the men and women who face the daunting task of combating these disasters can be complicated. And more often than not, it's the decision-making process that can mean the difference.

Dr. Andrew Manning, Associate Professor of Education and head of the Technology Learning Research Centre at MSVU, has created a simulation designed to help firefighters and paramedics experience what it is like to assume the role of incident or medical commander and to learn from that experience. This is the SIMergency Project. The software simulation was developed by Manning and his team, with input from the City of Brampton, Ontario's Fire and Emergency Services and Nova Scotia's Emergency Medical Care.

Responders engage in a real-world situation where their decision-making skills are continuously tested. Manning based his research on a subject of particular interest to him - social learning.

"People don't just learn from books, they learn from observing and working with others," he says. "I wanted to see how we can learn from others in a more systematic way."

The current prototype places firefighters and paramedics at the scene of a fire burning through a three-storey rooming house. The software is reactive to the decisions that the incident commander makes and allows for input that changes the way the fire progresses through the house. "You can change the direction of

the wind, or change the amount and type of flammable material in the room," he explains.

SIMergency was awarded \$2.1 million under ACOA's Atlantic Innovation Fund. The Fund is designed to strengthen Atlantic Canada's economy by increasing the region's capacity to carry out leadingedge R&D that contributes directly to the development of new technology-based economic activity.

The project's technology partners are Sierra Systems and the New Brunswick Community College - Bathurst.

The software has the potential to expand into simulations of many other complex

catastrophes, further enhancing the skills of those involved.

"The fact that this can be online allows participants to be anywhere. Then, they can debrief on what went well and what can be improved," says Manning.

The prototype of SIMergency debuted last August at the Fire Rescue Canada Training and Education Symposium in Halifax. Fire chiefs, firefighters and first responders from across the country provided valuable and overwhelmingly positive feedback to the researchers.

Rachel MacDougall

Student, Master of Arts in Family Studies and Gerontology

While studying Family Science at UPEI, Rachel MacDougall became aware of the Atlantic Seniors Housing Research Alliance. An opportunity arose from CIHR for undergraduates to apply for funding to work with the Alliance. MacDougall was successful and this led to her participating in a pilot survey on addressing the housing needs of seniors. This survey became the basis for the more extensive one used by Dr. Donald Shiner's project.

When it came time to begin applying for graduate studies, MacDougall immediately thought of MSVU. She came to campus in January of 2007 as a member of the Family Studies and Gerontology program where her research continues.

She is working in the Maritime Data Centre at the Mount 'cleaning the data' from the extensive survey of over 1600 seniors. Her efforts will be the basis of her thesis, which she plans to complete and defend in 2009.

"Working in the Data Centre means an almost-daily increase to my skill set," says MacDougall. "I am constantly learning something new."

Hearing the Voices of Seniors

MSVU researchers are learning that seniors have much to say about how and where they want to live.

The Nova Scotia Centre on Aging is located on campus. One of the objectives of the Centre is to work with community partners to identify and address issues facing seniors. Housing is definitely one of these issues.

The late Dr. Patrick O'Neill, former Director of Research at MSVU, found a way to connect the mandate of the Centre and work being done by his colleague, Dr. Donald Shiner, Associate Professor with the Department of Business Administration & Tourism and Hospitality Management, had designed a consulting tool for property developers to determine the feasibility of building new assisted living facilities. At the heart of the tool is a formula to evaluate the market and demand.

"Patrick knew I had developed this and he asked if I could work with the Centre to see how the tool could be used to predict the future housing needs of seniors," Shiner recalls.

Shiner began working with the Centre and he and Cathy Crouse (former director of the Centre) organized the Atlantic Seniors Housing Research Alliance, which consists of over 35 organizations including seniors groups, universities and government. A proposal to gather comprehensive data on this issue was submitted to SSHRC. The proposal was successful and in January of 2005, \$1.2 million in funding was received from SSHRC, government departments in each of the four Atlantic Provinces as well as the Canadian Mortgage and Housing Corporation.

The project has several phases, including the development of a 68-page survey that resulted in over 1600 responses from Atlantic Canadian seniors.

"Seniors move an average of three times after age 65," he says, "but 93 per cent of them don't want to move at all. Only seven per cent ever live in a seniors' home."

Shiner and his team of researchers feel their work can have a real impact on shaping policy.

"Our next step is to look at how other countries around the world address this and develop 10-12 in-depth case studies. Then we'll look at current policies in Atlantic Canada as well as the existing policy barriers for seniors."

For example, in South Korea, the law states that if a parent wishes, he or she can live

with their oldest child, and the child can not refuse.

The final phase will focus on recommendations for change to close the gap between what is and what could be. The spring of 2009 brings a Seniors Housing Conference to Atlantic Canada where the group will present its findings.

Discovering the Implications of Healthy Eating

A healthy diet means much more than just eating right. There are many educational. social and economic factors that play a role in the selection of foods and their health value.

Dr. Theresa Glanville, Professor, Department of Applied Human Nutrition, is studying how diet quality is impacted by income and other social factors and how this can also be linked to Body Mass Index (BMI.) BMI is a measure of a person's height relative to their weight.

For the first time in almost 35 years, comprehensive data are available which is critical to her research. The Canadian Community Health Survey, a joint project of Health Canada and Statistics Canada, gathered the BMI of 35,000 Canadians from across the country. The subjects also participated in a 'dietary recall' to measure their food intake of the previous 24 hours and they completed a general health questionnaire.

With the assistance of a CIHR grant of nearly \$50,000 Glanville and her team are analyzing the quality of the participants' diet with a focus on the types of foods they eat. "Foods with lower nutrient densities are usually highly processed and generally cheaper," she says, "and often quality of diet is linked to income."

Glanville is using the Healthy Eating Index to measure diet quality. This rates different aspects of the diet and produces a score out of 100 - the lower the score. the poorer the diet. They will be crossreferencing this with the BMI findings.

Generally, the higher the BMI, the higher the body weight and the more likely a person would be classified as overweight or obese.

The data gathered in the study also provides a revealing glimpse into the food security of Canadians. This does not mean how safe food is, rather the participants' access to enough food and a good variety.

"We wanted to see how people rate themselves. Are they totally food secure, insecure but not hungry, insecure and hungry, or perhaps the worst, insecure and child hungry."

Glanville and her colleagues will be looking at existing policies to see how her research can influence the factors that determine diet choice and overall health.

Holly Hughes

Student, Master of Science in Applied **Human Nutrition**

Holly Hughes is in her second year as a Master of Science student at the Mount. She is one of the hands-on researchers examining the many facets of the Canadian Community Health Survey.

During her first year, she was a student of Dr. Theresa Glanville and was looking for ideas for her thesis. When Glanville received her CIHR grant, she approached Hughes to become a research analyst.

Hughes wants to become a dietitian and found the project appealing because it looked at more than what people eat. The data takes into account income, age, gender and food security.

"This project has provided me with an opportunity I wouldn't have had anywhere else. This is cutting-edge research on a national scale," she says.

Research House



Research continues to expand and enhance the Mount campus. The Research House on Melody Drive was purchased in 2005, with renovations completed in April of 2006.

Many different research projects take place in the Research House. Faculty, along with their teams of coinvestigators and research assistants embark on projects ranging from food security to workfamily issues to gambling. The facility houses a media room for focus group discussions, a boardroom, and the state-of-the-art technology necessary for complex research.

MSVU Welcomes Two New Canada Research Chairs

Dr. Patricia Williams, Associate Professor. Department of Applied Human Nutrition, was appointed to the position of Canada Research Chair (CRC) (Tier II) in Food Security and Policy Change. Williams has also been awarded a \$650,000 infrastructure grant through the Canadian Centre for Innovation in support of her research. Her research focuses on food security and food costing.

Dr. Marnina Gonick, Faculty of Education and Department of Women's Studies,

was appointed as Canada Research Chair (Tier II) in Gender Identity and Social Practices. Gonick has also been awarded a \$240,000 infrastructure grant through the Canadian Centre of Innovation in support of her research, which focuses on empowering girls.

These appointments fulfill all of the Mount's CRC positions. Dr. Janice Keefe, CRC in Aging and Caregiver Policy, and Dr. Dianne Looker, CRC in Equity and Technology hold the other Chairs.

Dr. Janice Keefe Receives Major Funding Award

As millions of baby boomers approach retirement, issues around Canada's aging population are at the forefront of research and policy analysis for Dr. Janice Keefe, Canada Research Chair (CRC) in Aging and Caregiving Policy at MSVU.

With the renewal of her position as CRC, Keefe will receive \$500,000 in funding from the CRC Program to continue her work. Over the past five years, the merits of her multidisciplinary research endeavors have significantly increased awareness about family/friend caregiving and home care for Canada's aging population.

One of Keefe's biggest successes has been the development of an assessment tool to identify caregivers' needs. It suggests how home care programs can best use existing resources to reduce burnout and improve the quality of life for caregivers, families and those they care for.

"I'm studying caregiver issues from many different viewpoints," Keefe explains.

"The assessment tool is exciting because it's a tangible product that can be used by provincial health care programs."

She also studies specific health care challenges facing aging populations in rural communities, the overall health of women who combine paid work and caregiver responsibilities, and the future of Canada's supply of, and demand for, individual caregivers for seniors.

In addition to this award, Keefe will receive \$75,000 in funding for infrastructure from the Canada Foundation for Innovation's (CFI) Leadership Opportunities Fund. CFI is an independent corporation established by the government of Canada to strengthen national research capability through investments in research infrastructure in Canadian universities, colleges, hospitals and eligible not-for-profit organizations.

In the first four years of her chair, MSVU received over \$3.4 million from national and international funding agencies in support of Keefe's research activities.

Helping families in the Dominican Republic

A living example of MSVU values

A conversation, almost thirty years ago, between Sr. Catherine McGowan, ACAD '44, BScHE '48, of the Sisters of Charity and MSVU Professor Emeritus Dr. Alleyne Murphy, DHumL, '97, has changed the lives of countless children in the Dominican Republic.

"In the mid 70s", explains Murphy, "CIDA (Canadian International Development Agency) was focusing on how to link the expertise in universities with aiding the developing world. At this time, MSVU was discussing the need to reach out to help women in these areas."

A faculty member of the Home Economics Department, as it was known at the time, Murphy was personally interested in how she could help families at the most basic levels – food, shelter and safety.

Sr. Catherine, who had been living in Bani, Dominican Republic in connection with her work as a Sister of Charity, returned to Halifax on sabbatical.

She met with Murphy and they discussed the huge problem of child malnutrition in the poor areas of the country.

"Fifty per cent of children died before the age of five and the average weight of a 3-year-old was 15 pounds," recalls Murphy.

Sr. Catherine had established relationships with the country and an understanding of the language and culture, so the two decided to collaborate on a proposal to CIDA. They wanted to create a facility to educate women on nutrition, general hygiene and food preparation techniques. They were successful and in 1977, they were awarded a grant of \$77,000 to build the Centre for Nutrition Education and Recuperation in Bani.

The program was designed so that thirty children attended this day care centre for a minimum of three months, with the mothers participating one day a week.

"What we were seeing was that the mothers would

wean their children from breastfeeding at about one year, and put them directly on the family diet, without preparing weaning foods." This, and poor hygiene, contributed significantly to the malnutrition problem.


At the Centre, the mothers learned how to transform the staple diet of rice and beans into a toddler-friendly meal, as well as incorporate fruit juices and other more nutritionally robust foods.

"We wanted to ensure the lessons they learned at the Centre could be duplicated in the home, so we used foods and tools that were available to them. This did so much for the selfesteem of these women. They

were failing to keep their children alive and they now could do this and do it well. They just blossomed."

Today, the Centre has developed into a community centre with a pharmacy, preschool and an adult education component. Peace Corps workers have even been trained there.

Sr. Catherine remains in the Dominican Republic with other members of the Sisters of Charity, but comes home every two years. During these visits, she always meets with Murphy to update her on the Centre and the families that were helped by their conversations and friendship.



One of MSVU's own has been recognized with the prestigious Prime Minister's Awards for Excellence in Early Childhood Education.

Patty Monaghan, BCS '89, director of the Magic Ladybug Learning Centre in Halifax, received a Certificate of Excellence. She was the lone Atlantic Canadian recipient of this award.

The Prime Minister's Awards are presented to an individual (or up to a team of three) to recognize the efforts of outstanding early childhood educators who excel at fostering the early development and socialization of the children in their care.

She was recognized for her impressive 20-year career, the bulk of which was spent working with families of children with special needs at The Progress Centre for Early Intervention, the Toronto Easter Seals Preschools, and supporting the integration of young children with special needs into child care programs. Monaghan co-wrote a book and training program called Building Blocks: Strategies for Inclusion that is used today by the provincial governments of all four Atlantic provinces in the training of Early Childhood Educators.

Monaghan was nominated by her husband and fellow MSVU alumnus, Brian Murray, BA '89. She was inspired to open the Magic Ladybug Learning Centre after the couple adopted two girls, Molly, now 6, and Katie, now 4, from China.

"We felt it was important to have a connection with and understanding of Chinese culture," says Monaghan "and to create an environment with positive Chinese role models."

In September of 2005, the Centre opened with 14 spaces and has been full ever since. Monaghan has two staff members from Asia who help her run the Centre. The Assistant Director, Tanya Inglis, BAA (CYS) '03, runs the English program with her.

The focus is on introducing a Chinese language and culture program to young children 18 months to five years. It is open to all children, not just children adopted from China.

Monaghan has implemented the "one speaker, one language approach, so they're hearing English and Chinese naturally throughout the day," she says.

They even offer workshops in Mandarin to parents and have audio files of lessons available on the web site to help them at home.

Monaghan says she was 'embarrassed but very excited' when she received news of the successful nomination. She received a letter of congratulations from Prime Minister Harper, the certificate and a financial award of \$5,000 to fund equipment, resource materials or other tools. Monaghan and her staff have received many accolades from the Province of Nova Scotia and Halifax Regional Municipality for this important acknowledgement of their work.

Barrie Dunn

Enjoying Success on both Sides of the Camera

Barrie Dunn, BPR '85, became involved with the phenomenon known as the Trailer Park Boys when he saw the short film at the Atlantic Film Festival.

He immediately thought these unusual characters could be developed into a television series. The next day he drove to Sydney, Cape Breton to meet with writer/director Mike Clattenburg. Dunn collaborated with Clattenburg and his high school pals

Robb Wells and John Paul Tremblay on the proposal. Next, Dunn and Clattenburg flew to Toronto for initial meetings but were unsuccessful. That was until they pitched the idea to Showcase.

The series' seventh season premiered April 8, 2007 on Showcase, with Dunn returning in his role as Ricky's father, Ray. During the summer of 2006, the feature film *Trailer Park Boys The Movie* premiered with the best opening weekend box office results ever for a Canadian film. The film received a Best Picture nomination at the 2006 Genie Awards.

Dunn and his partners in Trailer Park Productions continue to contemplate where Ricky, Julian and Bubbles will go next. They are currently weighing the options of a film sequel and oneepisode specials for television.

Dunn also frequently ventures outside of the world of Sunnyvale. He wrote and co-produced *Canada Russia '72*, a four-hour dramatic mini-series for CBC Television which premiered last year to great audience numbers. Dunn's company has purchased the rights to the British play *Comedians*, which he is developing into a Canadian production with Clattenburg directing. Another project has him exploring the political thriller genre, telling the story of the assassination of a Russian journalist.

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




