The Centre for Social Innovation and Community Engagement in Military Affairs is seeking candidates for a *Postdoctoral Research Fellow in Gender and the Transition from Military to Civilian Life in Canada.* The Centre conducts research in three main areas: 1) Gender Integration and Sexual Violence in the Canadian Armed Forces, 2) Veterans' Transition from Military to Civilian Life, and 3) Community-Engaged Research on War and Peace. In addition to research, the Centre aims to foster innovative dialogue among researchers, policy makers, advocates, and the public on military and defence policy, veterans policy, and peace and security. The successful applicant will report to Dr. Maya Eichler, Tier 2 Canada Research Chair in Social Innovation and Community Engagement. The Postdoctoral Fellow will work closely with Dr. Eichler and will contribute to, and complement, her research programme on gender and the transition from military to civilian life in Canada. The Postdoctoral Fellow will also be allocated time to conduct independent research, write peer reviewed publications, prepare grant applications, and take a lead role in organizing Centre events. Teaching is not a requirement of this position, but can be pursued beyond the responsibilities of the position.

Qualifications:

- Completed PhD at the time of appointment in a Social Science field, such as Political Science, Public Policy Studies, Women and Gender Studies, Sociology, Anthropology, International Relations, History, or related field.
- Demonstrated knowledge and an emerging profile in one or more of the following fields: feminist International Relations, Critical Military Studies, gender and war studies, and/or veteran research.
- Knowledge of Canadian defence policy and veteran issues is an asset.
- Aptitude for designing and implementing research, including fieldwork (surveys, focus groups, interviews, etc.).
- Demonstrated proficiency with qualitative data analysis and related software (e.g. MAXQDA).
- Excellent oral and written communication skills in English.
- Demonstrated ability to work both collaboratively and independently developing grant applications, carrying out research projects, and writing publications.
- Emerging track record of academic publications and conference presentations.
