Alexa McDonough

Earlier this fall, the Mount community was thrilled when Alexa McDonough, DHumL '09, joined the University as its Interim President and Vice-Chancellor. She will hold this position until August 2010. The Mount had previously recognized McDonough with an Honorary Degree at the Spring 2009 convocation.

Well known in the Maritimes as well as on the national stage, McDonough began her career in the field of social planning for the City of Halifax. There, she was deeply affected by the events of the demolition of Africville and the relocation of its residents. McDonough raised her voice in support of the displaced community, an early indication of her great concern for social justice. From there she moved

to a position as a professor at the Maritime School of Social Work, and later worked as a social policy researcher.

In 1979, McDonough made the life-changing decision to enter the political world. She sought and won the leadership of the Nova Scotia New Democratic Party in 1980, and was elected to the Nova Scotia legislature the following year. She would lead her party for the next fourteen years. She was instrumental in fighting for, and winning, the first ban on extra billing in Canada. McDonough also championed worker health, safety improvements, human rights protections and pay equity.

She moved to the national political scene in 1995, becoming the Leader of the New Democratic Party of Canada, and the first woman to lead a recognized political party in Canada. She was elected as the Member of

Parliament for Halifax in 1997 and became the first woman to win four consecutive terms.

Throughout her political career, she actively encouraged women to enter pubic life, including her support for the Women In House program organized by Mount Political Studies students. For those various efforts, she has received numerous national awards for her work on peace, human rights and social justice.

As the Mount's interim president, McDonough will work closely with members of the senior administration team, supporting them in their efforts around the overall management of the University. She will also lead the ongoing implementation of the University's Strategic Plan, *Destination 2012*, and play an integral role in the Mount's Capital Campaign, *Building Tomorrow Together.*

Destination 2012 Putting the Plan into Action



Jeff Hollett, Associate Vice-President, Student Experience

As part of *Destination 2012*, the Mount's strategic plan, a new role has been created — Associate Vice-President, Student Experience. Jeff Hollett assumed the role in July of 2009 and is committed to improving the overall student experience at the Mount as well as enrolment management.

Hollett was previously Assistant Vice-President Student Services at Mount Allison University. There, he was responsible for International activities and for admissions and recruitment. Hollett has also held similar roles at Unitec New Zealand and Murdoch University in Australia. Hollett brings passion and commitment to the new position of Associate Vice-President, Student Experience. He is known for getting results and places high priority on the interests of students.

"A constant in all healthy post-secondary institutions is the desire to strengthen its student selection, engagement and retention programming," said Hollett. "Leading institutions redefine themselves by continuously refining their approaches in these areas."

This summer, Hollett led a committee aimed at stepping up recruitment efforts for the month of August. Working closely with the Students' Union, Admissions, the Registrar's Office, University Advancement, Distance Learning and Public Affairs, a number of initiatives were executed to target students who might have thought it was too late to enroll. The "It's Never Too Late" campaign saw a direct increase in admissions inquiries in the weeks it was rolled out.

NEW NANCY'S CHAIR APPOINTED




Dr. Rita Deverell, CM has been appointed as the 12th Nancy's Chair in Women's Studies. Dr. Deverell assumed the two-year position in July of 2009. Her distinguished career has included work as an academic, broadcaster, television producer/ director, journalist, arts administrator and theatre artist. Dr. Deverell holds a BA in Philosophy from Adelphi University, an MA in History of Religions from Columbia University and an EdD in Curriculum from OISE at the University of Toronto. She was the first woman to lead a journalism program in Canada in her role as Director of the School of Journalism at the University of Regina in the 1980s. She recently completed her term as head of news and current affairs at the Aboriginal People's Network and is a founding member of Vision TV. the world's first multi-faith and multicultural network.

Dr. Deverell was recognized in 2005 with an Order of Canada for her pioneering work in journalism. She is the author of several screenplays for which she also served as producer and director. She has held visiting professorships at the University of Western Ontario and New York University.

The Nancy's Chair in Women's Studies, was established at Mount Saint Vincent University in the mid-1980s. Endowed by well-known Toronto-based feminist and philanthropist Senator Nancy Ruth, DHumL '89, the Chair raises awareness of women's issues by bringing to campus distinguished scholars in women's studies and activists who have contributed to the advancement of women.

The presence of the Chair adds substantially to the intellectual strength of women's studies at the Mount and in the Atlantic region. Duties associated with the Chair include teaching, research, and delivering public presentations on campus and around the Atlantic provinces.



Mount Professor Receives Prestigious Award for her Contribution to Co-operative Studies




Dr. Leslie Brown, Professor, Department of Sociology & Anthropology, and former board member of the Canadian Association for Studies in Co-operation (CASC), was recently presented with the Merit Award for Exemplary Contributions to Co-operative Studies in Ottawa. CASC is a not-for-profit, volunteer based association, which focuses on local and international studies of all facets of co-operation and cooperative organizations. Her focus on teaching and student training, as well as her contribution to the advancement of knowledge through publications and research, has greatly benefited CASC.

"It was a complete and wonderful surprise," she said. "I greatly admire those who have received the award in the past, and it is an honour to join in their company."

A member of CASC since 1985, she has played an important role in introducing new members to the organization, has been active on the scholarship committee, and was involved in most of the annual conferences.

Dr. Brown's research has focused on organizational democracy, social cohesion, community development, and co-operative identity. Most recently she has been involved in researching the ways co-operatives and credit unions conduct social and ethical accounting, auditing and reporting. In addition, Dr. Brown researches the ways social reporting can be used by co-operatives to further their ability to meet their social and environmental commitments.



Mark Forward, BBA '93, has been named Athletics Officer and Head Coach of the Mount Mystics Women's Basketball team. He has held the position of Assistant Coach with the Mount's men's program for the past nine years. In 1991, he was named the University's first CCAA All Canadian as a student.

Before coaching full-time, Forward had a successful career as Operations Manager at both IKON Business Solutions and Honeywell Building Solutions. He is certified with the National Coaching Certification Program and was Head Coach at Daltech from 1993 to 2000.

Food for thought

For the third year in a row, Mount students have come out on top of the National Canadian Association of Foodservice Professionals (CAFP) Conference, held in Calgary in June of 2009.

The prestigious Student Branch of the Year Award is given annually to the branch that excels in certain areas. The criteria include: student body membership recruitment, educational meetings, published articles, humanitarian projects, publicity, special awards and co-operation with professional branches. There are 17 student branches across Canada vying for this award each year.

The Mount Student Branch boasts 90 members, all from the Applied Human Nutrition program. This past year, the students initiated many projects including developing a calendar with recipes promoting seasonal and locally grown foods, co-coordinating a guest speaker series and volunteering for the Ronald McDonald House/IWK Health Centre's program Home for Dinner.



This educational text is suited for those studying both education and gerontology and is based on Burton's graduate thesis. The text examines a school-based curriculum designed to educate grades 3, 6 and 9 students about aging, ageism and intergenerational relations. The work discusses ageism, intergenerational programs, and how to conduct an implementation evaluation.



Peggy's Letters, (Orca Book Publishers) by Jacqueline Halsey, BA '94

In the final months of World War II, tenyear-old Peggy shelters with her mother and baby brother in a London butcher's shop during an air raid. They survive, but their home and everything in it are lost, including Peggy's most treasured possession, a biscuit tin of letters from her father. Their lives change dramatically and Peggy makes friends with a boy named Spud who has a passion for scavenging bombsites, leading to more than one surprising discovery.



A Travel in Time to Grand Pré, (St. Clair Publications) by Michele Doucette, BCS '85, MEd '00

This is a historically informative adventure, tying the history of the descendants of Yeshua to modern day Nova Scotia. Madeleine Sinclair feels disconnected with the era of her birth, yet aware of herself in another time period. Traveling back to 1754, she comes to learn, live and experience the lives of the French Acadian people, meeting Michel LeBlanc. Through the warm, loving and helpful guidance of fellow time traveler, Madame Pêche, she comes to understand the predetermined course of her Sinclair bloodline, beginning with Rollo the Viking, father of William Longsword, a line that is shown to be linked to the Merovingians, the Cathars and the Knights Templar (protectors of the Holy Grail).

A fun, read-aloud pirate story that will be a favourite with educators. Set in the misty waters around Halifax Harbour, this fun read-aloud pirate story follows the adventures of a terrible, horrible, smelly pirate named Sydney and his friend Parrot Polly. After answering a riddle set by a tricky mermaid the rascals dig for treasure by the old lighthouse on McNab's Island.



The Gran Plan, (Scholastic Education 2006) by Jacqueline Halsey, BA '94

This book placed third in the 2003 Atlantic Writing Competition/ Joyce Barkhouse award for Children's Literature. Subsequently, it was published by Scholastic in the fall of 2006 as part of their Literacy Place for the Early Years, School Reading Program.



The Cinematic Jane Austen: Essays on the Filmic Sensibility of the Novels (McFarland Publishers) by Dr. David Monaghan,

Professor Emeritus, Department of English, with Ariane Hudelet and John Wiltshire

The publishers describe the book in this way: "Jane Austen's novels are loved because they possess a comedic power that is often conveyed through the singular voice of the narrators. Film adaptations, however, have often been unsatisfactory because they lack or awkwardly render features, particularly the voice of the narrators. This work argues for a fresh approach that begins with a reading of the novels that emphasizes their auditory and visual dimensions. Building on their examination of Austen's inherently cinematic features, the authors then develop productive new readings of the films."

This book is simultaneously a history of children's literature, an analysis of the modern conception of childhood, a study of the stylistics of children's literature, and a rhetorical examination of children's novels. These diverse strands together form a single thesis exploring the nature of children's play and what it reveals about children's biological nature and the nature of their literature.



Another 'Pointe' of View: The Life & Times of a Ballet Mom (Dreamcatcher Publishing) by PJ Parsons, Professor, Department of Public Relations

PJ Parsons tells her story as a ballet mom and how the journey through the landscape of the elite ballet world — always as an outsider — began. When she left her son all those miles from home at Canada's National Ballet School at the age of eleven, she was unprepared for this journey that eventually taught her important lessons about preparing a child for his own path.

Come Back to Campus

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Our University prides itself on its commitment to accessibility, high-quality programs and flexible learning approaches. While our campus is vibrant, we know we must extend our reach beyond its grounds.

To say that the post-secondary marketplace in Atlantic Canada – and across the country – is competitive is an understatement. With a declining population and more students finding balancing life's other demands increasingly difficult, recruitment and retention is tougher than ever.

Take Ryan Cochrane for example, a student and world-class athlete. This 26-year-old native of Windsor, Nova Scotia has been paddling since the age of seven. He recently competed in the 2009 Senior World Championships in Halifax where his team placed first in the semi finals and sixth overall.

In addition to his gruelling training schedule, Cochrane is also currently working toward completing his Bachelor of Science degree with a Major in Psychology through the Mount's Distance Education program. He is living and training in Ottawa.

"I am the kind of student who needs to attend class – even when I can't always be in Halifax," said Cochrane. "Distance learning allows me to stay connected to the Mount while I am training and competing." In addition to his recent achievement at the 2009 Senior World Championships, some of Cochrane's other accomplishments include winning bronze in K2 500m, K2 200m and K4 200m races at the 2008 National Championships. In 2007, he won gold in the K2 500m race at the National Championships in Ottawa, breaking a long-standing record. Ryan also placed first in the K2 500m race at the 2006 National Sprint Championships in Regina, Saskatchewan. His next goal is to make it to the 2012 Olympics in London. Studying, training, sourcing sponsorship - it all adds up.

"The Mount's distance program is exactly what I need to keep paddling," he said.

"We just wanted to share with you the results from Rvan's weekend of competition in Welland, Ontario. Ryan placed 1st in both K2 distances, the 500m and the 1000m. We just had to share this news with you as you have been such a big part of helping him to get to this point while still doing his studies. Thanks so much."

The Mount offers over 200 courses via distance education and had over 3,200 registrations during the 2008/2009 academic year.



The Mount has been offering students distance courses and programs via several delivery modes for close to 30 years – one of the first in Atlantic Canada to do so – and is still recognized as a true leader in this field, offering more programs than any other university in the Maritimes. Students can choose from 200 courses, 10 complete undergraduate programs and four complete graduate programs.

"We hear from our students every day, regardless if they are actually on campus," said Dr. Peter Mombourquette, Chair, Department of Business Administration & Tourism and Hospitality Management, a pioneering department in bringing distance to the Mount. "Students want and demand more - just as we want and demand more from them. To provide them with a flexible, top-quality education, the Mount must also provide our students with the best of today's tools for lifelong learning."

And how does the Mount reach students across the country and around the world? Well, it's not just through the television anymore.

"Many people still think that television (the former local cable channel 33) is how we still deliver distance courses," said Dr. Peggy Watts, Director, Distance Learning and Continuing Education. "While this was the cornerstone of the program when the Mount embarked on distance learning years ago. today our primary distance delivery vehicle is the web." All distance courses, including those with televised lectures, use the online course management system, Moodle, for interaction. In addition, many online courses have weekly contact sessions to allow for classroom time discussions using teleconferencing, online chat, or a virtual classroom, via a program called Elluminate Live!

Television is still present at the Mount. That's why you'll often recognize a former prof as you are passing by Eastlink's digital channel 333 or the A Network. Students can also borrow DVDs of source material, record the content themselves or download it online.

"We are seeing an increasing demand for the flexibility distance offers," stated Watts. "Our numbers for fall of 2009 have exceeded last year's registrations."

The possibilities for distance education are endless. The Mount's Master of Public Relations and the Master of Arts in Public Relations degrees are evolving to become 100 per cent available via distance for the 2010/2011 academic year.

"We know public relations practitioners are located around the world and we know they have demanding schedules as many of them are working in challenging roles," said Dr. Amy Thurlow, BPR '89, Chair, Department of Public Relations. "The flexibility and choice we will now be able to offer will make our programs – and the Mount – even more competitive." 📈



The Faculty of Education has enjoyed success in Jamaica for 10 years. Mount faculty visit Jamaica to deliver the MEd (Lifelong Learning) graduate program. There are Jamaican alumnae now teaching in this program in Jamaica. The Mount also confers a Bachelor of Education in Association with St. Joseph's Teachers College in Kingston, Jamaica.

Q and A with Dr. Gwendoline James, MEd '01, Guidance Counselor and Lecturer, The Mico University College in Kingston, Jamaica. James is also the President, Jamaica Chapter, Mount Saint Vincent Alumnae Association.

What did it mean to you personally to be able to take your MEd in Jamaica from Mount Saint Vincent University?



I had done certificate studies in adult education and was actively involved in teaching adults using the adult learning methodologies. As I became more interested in the field of adult education as a course of study when the opportunity arose to access the program from the Mount, I felt a sense of academic fulfillment. This was because the program was the first in Jamaica and I was comfortable with the team of professors and facilitators along with my Jamaican colleagues, who enabled me to share my knowledge and skills with them in very creative ways. It was this experience that finally honed my leadership capabilities. I became extremely self confident knowing that I am a catholic and here was a university with such a foundation and a course of study that really matched my interest.



Can you describe how taking the MEd program fit into your life as an educator?



The course content enabled me to develop a personal philosophy relative to my working with adult learners. As a result I have learnt to be more reflective in thought and I examine concepts ideas, etc. in a more critical manner. As an educator I constantly seem to guestion and revise my roles as I seek to motivate learners, use them as resources and consider their learning styles.



What is the impact of the Mount's Faculty of Education in Jamaica?



First of all, their presence has contributed to the numbers of trained adult educators in particular, in the Jamaican society. It has also enabled students of the programs offered, to use adult and early childhood methodologies to facilitate and enhance learning at various levels in the society both formally and informally. Students' involvement in community activities initially through the practicum experience has facilitated their voices being heard as advocates in the promotion of continued lifelong learning projects.

This summer we also hosted the 19th annual MSV Golf Classic. The Golf Classic has grown and evolved into the largest annual fundraiser for the Association. This year was our most


successful event to date with more than 110 golfers enjoying a day of fun and raising funds to support the goals and objectives of the Alumnae Association.



Mount Alumnae Among Those Honoured at Nurses' Centennial



Last spring, the College of Registered Nurses held its Centennial Celebrations. The highlight of the day was the presentation of the prestigious Centennial Award of Distinction. This award was presented to 100 current and former registered nurses, 10 from each decade, for their significant contributions to the nursing profession.

There were several who had connections to the Mount. The following are some highlights from the careers and lives of those recognized during this special event. In addition, Donna Denney, BScN '72 was recently named as the organization's new Executive Director.

1960-1970

Sister Mary McCarthy, had a very distinguished career in nursing education in Nova Scotia as well as in the United States. She developed the first integrated/generic program at Mount Saint Vincent University in 1965, the first ever master's program in nursing informatics, and served as a consultant with the National League of Nurses. Sister McCarthy was inducted into the Alpha Omega Chapter of the Sigma Theta Tau, cited in Who's Who in American Nursing.

Brenda Montgomery, BScN '72 has had a tremendous impact on nursing through her roles in administration and education, as well as through her participation with the College. Throughout her career, she focused on improving clients' access to health care and students' access to the best education. Montgomery's dedication to the profession of nursing was exemplified in her professional work with the then Registered Nurses' Association of Nova Scotia, the Canadian Nurses Association, and the International Congress on Women's Health Issues. She assisted registered nurses to realize their worth and acted as their mentor.

Marguerite Muise, BScN '65, held key positions in nursing education and nursing regulation with both Mount Saint Vincent University and the College of Registered Nurses. As Coordinator of Registration at the College, from 1978 until her

retirement in 2004, she interpreted and administered the RN Act, regulations, by-laws and polices applicable to initial and annual registration and licensure; prepared provincial and national reports; and managed the registrant database. During her tenure at the College, Muise initiated many significant improvements to the processing of RNs' licence applications, including the introduction of online registration. Muise is a former member of the MSV Alumnae Association Board of Directors, is involved in the Mount's Capital Campaign, and is a member of the Ex Libris book club, a book club comprised of Mount alumnae.

1980-1990

Ruby Blois, BScN '73, has a reputation for innovation. Her focus while at the IWK was on nursing development. Her vision for nursing practice evolved into the creation of an environment that supported a full professional role for registered nurses: ensuring their expertise through the development of nursing research and shared governance. Blois established the Department of Nursing Research at the IWK, and among her many other achievements at the local, provincial and national levels were her involvement in leading the Children's Telehealth Network and development of the Nova Scotia Nurses' Telehealth Network. Blois served as Chair of the Mount's Board of Governors from 1996-2001.

From the time she graduated with a nursing diploma, and throughout her entire career, Dr. Barbara Keddy, **BScN** '75, demonstrated creative and innovative skills. She held a wide range of nursing roles, from staff nurse to a joint professorial appointments at Dalhousie University. Keddy's expertise in the development of quantitative and qualitative research methods courses, her advocacy and mentorship abilities, and her participation as the co-founder and first president of the Canadian Association of History of Nursing are but a few of her accomplishments in and contributions to the nursing profession. Folia Montana featured her book on Fibromyalgia in the Fall 2008 issue.

1990-2000

Christine Power, BScN '77, has been an exemplary leader throughout her nursing career. She is a fearless and innovative individual, with extensive experience and expertise in both strategic and operational leadership, academics, tertiary care and community health programs. A brave risk taker. she is often said to be at her best during upheaval and chaos. She is a passionate mentor to others and is recognized internationally for positively influencing patient and citizen engagement in the development of best approaches to health care approaches that Power always ensures has the patient at its centre. MURIEL DUCKWORTH

A life to Celebrate



Muriel Duckworth, CM, ONS, DHumL '78, a Nova Scotian peace activist best known as one of the founding members of the national peace group Voice of Women, passed away August 22. She was 100.

Duckworth co-founded a variety of social action groups and played crucial roles in several humanitarian organizations, including Oxfam Canada, where she served on the board of directors in the 1970s. In 1983, Duckworth was made a companion of the Order of Canada and won the Lester B. Pearson Peace Medal in 1991. She was nominated in 2005 (among 1,000 women collectively) for a Nobel Peace Prize. She received the Order of Nova Scotia posthumously on October 8, 2009.

Duckworth was one of five children born in Austin, Quebec, to Anna Westover and Ezra Ball. In 1947, she and her late

husband, Jack, moved to Halifax. They were pacifists and their vocal opposition to the Second World War drew much ridicule at the time.

During the Vietnam War, she and other Voice of Women members were instrumental in arranging a tour to Canada for Vietnamese women directly affected by the war. In fact, she protested wars dating back to the Second World War.

She also performed as a member of the Raging Grannies — the funny, hat-wearing, shawl-sporting troupe of women who lend their voices to promote peace.

Experience with the Mount Community Leads to Lifelong Learning

In 1998, Paula Hutchinson's, BA '04, MAEd '05 son Douglas was diagnosed with autism at the age of four. Hutchinson enrolled her son in the Mount's Early Intervention Program for Children with Autism at the Child Study Centre. The program provides a caring, inclusive learning environment for children as well as an invaluable teaching opportunity for Mount students in the Department of Child and Youth Study.

Prior to her son's diagnosis, Hutchinson worked in the community supporting families and youth with autism. "I thought I knew what families were experiencing," said Hutchinson, "but I quickly found out that I didn't know enough."

"The Mount was the best choice for me," recalled Hutchinson, "and I wanted to learn more about child development." She then made the decision to complete a Bachelor of Arts (Psychology), where she graduated with distinction in 2004. During this time, she focused on the field of child development and autism. The next step was to pursue her Masters in Arts in Education (Educational Psychology), where she received the Senate Medal of Distinction in 2005.

Her studies have placed her on the path of leading many important research projects that have real-world applications for families, medical professionals and the community.

She is currently a researcher with the Nova Scotia Partnership on Respite, Family Health and Well-being. Here, she is providing knowledge translation of research evidence on respite, care giving and home-based programs for children with autism as well as developmental and physical disabilities to an interdisciplinary team of professionals, parents and community members.

Respite is a crucial element to care for children with special needs – both for the child and care giver(s).

"It is more than a break," Hutchinson explained. "Certainly every parent needs one, but they also need a change in their lives. Parents want to know that while they are enjoying the respite their children are participating in activities that are beneficial, healthy and fun. It has to be an enriching experience for both."

With funding from the IWK Health Centre and Nova Scotia Health Research Foundations, Hutchinson has traveled with the Nova Scotia Partnership on Respite across Nova Scotia giving workshops and conducting research on respite. "It's so important for those parents who are not connected into the network to know there is help out there."

Hutchinson also sees her community-based research as a way to enhance and connect many of the existing services for children with complex needs. She hopes her research will serve as a bridge between health professionals and services available to families in their local communities. She and her partners have prepared a report which will be presented to the provincial government of Nova Scotia and are continually seeking funding to continue their work.

Hutchinson is still learning as she is completing her PhD at Dalhousie University where she is studying with Dr. Susan Bryson, a world renowned expert in autism research. She credits her time at the Mount for placing her on this journey. "The Mount allowed me to learn freely and really pursue what I was interested in. I developed as an academic, educator, and parent."
