The meeting was called to order at 2:04 p.m. R. Charlton, Interim President of the Students' Union, was welcomed to his first meeting. There were no observers present.

1. Indigenous Land Recognition

E. Church provided an acknowledgement that the Mount is built on traditional unceded Mi'kmaq territory and paid respect to the Indigenous peoples of the land on which Senate meets.

2. Approval of Agenda

"Election of Faculty Senator to the Search Committee for the Vice-President Administration" was added as agenda item 7.6.2.

Moved by G. MacDonald, seconded by D. Fisher, to approve the agenda as amended.
CARRIED

3. Approval of Minutes of January 25, 2019

Moved by P. Barry Mercer, seconded by D. Shiner, to approve the meeting minutes of January 25, 2019, as circulated. CARRIED

4. Business Arising from the Minutes

4.1. Change to Bylaw 12.1.1, Nominations for Honorary Degrees

C. Matta spoke to the nomination process and the value of knowing the nominator's name and the credibility it can lend to the nomination when being reviewed by the Tributes Committee and Senate. He proposed that the bylaw be revised to remove the stipulation that nominators' names be redacted.

R. Farmer asked that nominators be advised of this change before nominations go forward. It was agreed that this would be part of the process.

Moved by C. Matta, seconded by R. Zuk, that Senate approve the revision to Senate Bylaw 12.1.1 to strike the phrase that the names of the nominators be removed prior to the distribution of the dossiers, the revision to be effective immediately. CARRIED

Classroom Clocks

D. Shiner updated Senators on the item within the last meeting's minutes regarding the inaccuracy of classroom clocks. Concern was expressed on the ever-increasing discrepancy between the clocks in classrooms in Seton. In the absence of B. Jessop, E. Church agreed to address the concern with the Director, Facilities Management.

5. President's Announcements

In the President's absence, E. Church advised Senators of the Keshen Goodman Library series where faculty are invited twice per year to participate in a lecture series. A brief discussion was held on the venue, format, past participation, engagement and success of events; several Senators highlighted their participation in the series, and an upcoming theme at the library related to the 80th anniversary of Canada's entrance into the 2nd World War was noted. Faculty members interested in participating in the series were asked to contact A. Rafuse. Appreciation was expressed for the information. A collated book relating to people's experience during the war was highlighted. (E. Church, C. Slumkoski, D. Plumb, G. MacDonald)

E. Church thanked Senators for their feedback to date on the Freedom of Expression Statement and encouraged any additional feedback to be submitted by March 12th. She outlined next steps with regard to process and encouraged Senators to attend the open consultation session on March 7. The final statement, approved by Senate and endorsed by the Board of Governors, will be maintained as a 'living document' and used to continuously encourage dialogue and free expression on Campus.

Finally, she spoke to the overwhelming success of the upcoming 8th Annual Girl's Conference that sold out within two days; 350 girls are registered for the event with an additional 600 on the waitlist. The event, sponsored by the Alexa McDonough Institute, will host various cohorts of girls, including Aboriginal and African Nova Scotian, and feature an international keynote speaker. A personal welcome video from Julie Payette, Governor General of Canada, for the conference participants, and the possibility of the attendance of (or welcome personal video from) Sophie Trudeau was highlighted. Appreciation was expressed for the work undertaken by the Alexa McDonough Institute, on the event.

6. Question Period

C. Slumkoski questioned the membership (and in particular, faculty membership) on the Vice-President Administration Search Committee; concern was expressed on the naming of a faculty member to the committee without having utilized the faculty nomination process. A discussion was held on the difference in the process and nature of

appointment of academic versus non-academic administrators, committee selection, whether an Administrative Vice President serves an academic function, whether non-academic administrators can request an academic appointment, differences in the terms of appointments, and the proper selection process.

Other brief discussions were held on two Board policies governing the selection process and the Board of Governors' role in approving the appointments. A Senate document providing guidelines on constituency representation on search and evaluation committees for administrators ex officio on Senate was referenced. E. Church agreed to discuss Senators' feedback with the President who will update the Board. (C. Slumkoski, E. Church, R. Zuk, K. Ritchie, T. Findlay, P. Crouse)

N. Kayhani questioned whether consideration had been given to improving the quality of the air within Seton in the summer months. While some areas and offices do have air conditioning and others can work from home when offices are too warm, many, including administrative support, cannot. E. Church agreed, in the absence of B. Jessop, she would bring the concern to the Director of Facilities Management. (N. Kayhani, K. Ritchie)

T. Findlay requested an update on the Policy Against Sexual Assault; an overview was provided on the process, consultation with faculty following the last Senate meeting, revisions made to the policy based on faculty feedback, and approval by the Board of Governors. A question was raised on a change in language proposed at the last Senate meeting; it was noted that the Committee had reviewed the language but did not see the need to revise the current language. The approved policy has been added to Policy Central, a repository for all University policies; the website was viewed, and it was agreed that a link to the Policy Against Sexual Assault would be distributed to Senators. 7.5. Library

D. Fisher provided an overview of the upcoming year-end SLC meeting, themed “Open Access,” and spoke to (and acknowledged) the work being done by University Librarian, T. Harrison, and her team in tagging and labelling books in preparation of a possible future tracking system. Appreciation was expressed for the invitation to the open meeting.

A brief discussion was held on predatory publication including the importance of resources on predatory publishing, the success of a workshop facilitated by the Research Office last year on the topic, discussions held at CRP meetings on predatory publishing, wording within guidelines on grants directing applicants to resources, and the possible future modifications to the website to include more information on the topic. It was suggested that workshops also include a focus on the cost to make publications “open access” as it can be prohibitive. The possibility of initiating article processing charges for open access publishing and current discounts available through the library were noted.

Brief discussions were also held on the possibility of future gates between the EMF Library and the McCain Centre to discourage the removal of books from the library area, current technology and the work underway to move to an RFID tagging system, the impending purchase of equipment that will identify missing publications from stacks/shelves to improve inventory tracking, donations received and designated to the Library for use in the tagging program, and the value of tagging a percentage of the current inventory before purchasing gates. S. Perrott advised Senators that during the initial call for nominations, S. Orlov was nominated as faculty Senator to participate on this committee; he has agreed to allow his name to stand. As per the approved process, S. Perrott made three calls for nominations from the floor; there were no further nominations. S. Orlov was elected to the committee through acclamation.

T. Findlay suggested that, in the new paragraph on p. 1 of *Purpose and Envelopes of Funding*, the word “Normally” be added to the beginning of the second sentence to allow for extenuating or unique circumstances. G. MacDonald accepted this change as a friendly amendment.

G. MacDonald updated Senators that SSHRC was requesting internal grant money to be spent more quickly and was not distinguishing between awarding of the monies from SSHRC to the University and the allocation of the funding by CRP.

7.8. Student Experience

7.8.1. Revision to Non-Academic Discipline Policy

P. Barry Mercer acknowledged SE Committee members D. Lordly, L. Cashen Basso, Q. Stewart (Students' Union), and A. Kumar for their work over the year on the policy and D. Fisher for his consultation on the piece. She outlined the changes to the policy, noting that overall the policy does work well and that the revisions, were, in large part, editorial in nature and/or to update the policy. She highlighted changes to the policy, including the addition of a "Non-Academic Discipline Policy Incident Report Form" outlining information that is to be included in a complaint, the addition of an Appendix, and the removal of a timeline appendix.

C. Slumkoski suggested that in 1.2d the wording "no person" be replaced with "no student;" this was accepted as a friendly amendment.

A question was raised on the difference between "online" and "offline" conduct as it pertains to personal conduct versus conduct that affects another Campus constituent. As well, brief discussions were held on the increased use of social media in online bullying and a restorative approach versus a formal process. In 2.0c, a change was suggested and accepted ("themselves" for "themselves"). (S. Seager, P. Barry Mercer, T. Findlay, R. Zuk)

Moved by P. Barry Mercer, seconded by D. Fisher, that Senate approve the revised Non-Academic Discipline Policy and that the revised policy become effective immediately. CARRIED

8. Other Reports

8.1. Board of Governors

R. Farmer reported on the Board of Governors meeting including a presentation on cybersecurity, update on the Board Chair's activities, the President's report (given in her absence by the Board Chair and the Vice-President Administration), approval of the "Policy Against Sexual Assault", the review of the revised Freedom of Expression Statement, receipt of constituency reports from alumnae and students, and the appointment of D. Whalen as the Interim Vice-President Administration. He highlighted the report given to the Board from faculty member, S. Brigham, and noted the video provided by the Governor General of Canada for the beginning of the Girls Conference.

It was agreed that, on behalf of SCOITS, K. Smyth, Director, IT&S, be invited to provide the Cybersecurity presentation to Senate.

8.2. Students' Union

M. Mitchell and Interim Students' Union President, R. Charlton, shared responsibility for the Students' Union report, highlighting a timeline for the student elections, upcoming events, workshops and the AGM, work on the Students' Union budget, participation on Search Committees, student advocacy initiatives, and discussions held with Government officials regarding the MOU. They concluded by highlighting success of the recent Wellness Pantry food drive; despite its success, a higher level of donations from Feed NS is needed. Senators were encouraged to also donate food items to the Wellness Pantry or to bring them to the meeting for collection.

The students were commended for the recent changes made to the Students' Union Bylaws and appreciation was expressed for their work on a number of good governance initiatives.
