The Role of Senior Volunteers in Sustaining Rural Communities

A report prepared by Dr. Jane Gordon and Brenda Hattie provides valuable insight into the reality of rural senior volunteers. The findings serve as a contrast to much of the discussion around population aging which presents older adults as a social problem, one that is placing an increasing strain on social and economic resources. Key findings include:

- Seniors' volunteer work is significant to rural communities surviving and thriving
- Seniors' volunteer work enables seniors to stay in their community
- Seniors' volunteer work contributes to our culture and heritage industry
- Burnout by senior volunteers is a concern
- Challenges senior volunteer encounter include: Out of pocket expenses, lack of transportation, dwindling numbers, and reduced formal services

The report contains recommendations for organizations to recruit and retain volunteers and for government to help support seniors' important contributions to our rural communities.

Nexus Home Care Project



Preliminary results from personal interviews with 40 home support workers in Nova Scotia found that most were satisfied to very satisfied with their job. At the same time, they told us that they see clients with a lot of unmet need. Most experience sudden or unpredictable events during their home visit such as medical emergencies, falls, aggression and death. Most workers report job stress. Contributory factors include client behavior, client or family demands, inadequate equipment/supplies, travel

time between clients, and inability to meet client needs. Many also reported workplace safety concerns and issues with scheduling and compensation. This project was part of a larger study examining home care in Canada led by Dr. Anne Martin Matthews, University of British Columbia.

These results and those from interviews with workers in Ontario and British Columbia will help develop recruitment and retention strategies for the home care industry.

Family Violence & Elder Abuse

Dr. Deborah Norris and Pamela Fancey submitted their Final Report to Human Resources and Social Development Canada (HRSDC) on the lessons learned from family violence that can inform work on the important topic of elder abuse. This project was completed with the support of Alice Housing and NS Department of Seniors. The key messages from their research include:

- Inconsistent definitions and limiting screening protocols impact reporting practices and, therefore, the information available
- Lack of awareness, denial, shame and fear are barriers to reporting
- Adult protection legislation raises concerns about paternalism and infringement on rights and freedoms
- Responses to family violence and elder abuse vary by province
- Gender is important to understanding family violence but ageism is an added dimension in elder abuse
- Critical-ecological framework may be valuable as a unifying framework for advancing theory, policy and practice regarding family violence across the life span

An earlier version of the research was presented at an Expert Round Table organized by HRSDC at which national and international experts on the topic of elder abuse were present.

What's Happening... New

Canadian Dementia Translation Knowledge Network

A multidisciplinary team of researchers and practitioners have received \$4.3 million from the Canadian Institutes of Health Research to translate the latest dementia research into meaningful products for clinicians and the community. During this 5 year project, Dr. Keefe will coordinate provincial initiatives and be responsible for linking team members across the provinces.

Seniors' Legal Information Kit

The Legal Information Society of N.S. has received 3 year funding through the New Horizons Program, Elder Abuse Initiative to develop an information Kit on issues related to seniors legal affairs. NSCA is responsible for the evaluation of the 3 year project as well as testing a draft of the Kit with seniors and care providers throughout Nova Scotia.

Institute of Aging Summer Program in Aging (SPA)

The 2009 SPA will be hosted by NSCA and held at White Point Beach Resort, June 8-11, 2009. The goal of SPA is to provide graduate students and post doctoral fellows involved in aging research a program of advanced training that crosses disciplines, sectors, institutions, and geography. Participants have valuable opportunities to network with other students and leading Canadian researchers.

What's Happening... Ongoing

Cancer and Seniors' Mental Health

In collaboration with Dr. Penny MacCourt, University of Victoria, and other stakeholders from the seniors, mental health and cancer fields, NSCA is contributing to a project that explores the perspectives of seniors' experience with cancer. Focus groups and individual interviews with seniors have been conducted in Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Ontario, and British Columbia. Their experience with the disease as well as the health care system will inform the development of an educational pamphlet for seniors and a report for health care professionals to be available in the Spring 2009.

Projecting the Housing Needs of Aging Atlantic Canadians

Now in its final year, this multi-sectoral, collaborative project is collecting information and conducting analysis that will help inform decisions and planning of housing and support services for Atlantic Canadian seniors. Dr. Keefe is a Co-Investigator and NSCA is one of the many stakeholders involved contributing to the research and knowledge transfer activities. In addition to the report on the survey with more than 1700 Atlantic Canadian seniors, the project has recently released its report of the focus groups with select populations. The lead investigator, Dr. Shiner, has recently completed site visits to explore housing options and is preparing a documentary DVD of his findings. Plans are underway for the final project event – Atlantic Seniors Housing Needs Conference (see Upcoming Events).

Alzheimer's Disease and Other Dementias Care Course

Since November 2007, NSCA has been working intensely on the revisions to this provincially recognized course that is managed by a provincial advisory committee. The Course is 27 hours in length and comprised of nine learning modules. Approximately 800 care providers and volunteers who support persons with dementia complete the course each year. The revision process included reviewing the latest literature in dementia care, analyzing course evaluation data, and consulting with participants, facilitators and industry stakeholders. As well, each module was reviewed by a subject matter expert. The revised curriculum is ready. NSCA is delivering orientation sessions across the province with the Course facilitators to help prepare them deliver this new curriculum to Nova Scotia care providers.

Retirement Planning for Older Adults with Developmental Disabilities

This project, led by the Nova Scotia Community College and funded by the Public Health Agency of Canada, focuses on building links between the aging and developmental disability sectors. Its activities during the past three years have included the development of a Resource Guide, the development of a Discussion Paper, pilot project, workshops with front-line workers and numerous presentations. NSCA is a project partner and has also been evaluating the project and its outcomes. In the spring of 2008, the project received funding for an additional year to continue with its dissemination activities to front-line workers and to develop education resources for service providers in the disability and aging communities. NSCA continues its partner and evaluation roles until the Spring of 2009.

Seniors and Pension Information

The Legal Information Society of Nova Scotia, with funding from the Department of Seniors Positive Aging Fund, is developing an online resource to inform seniors about their legal rights and the issues associated with public pensions. NSCA has conducted a focus group with seniors who reviewed the draft resource and provided valuable comments regarding its relevance, presentation and accessibility. Their comments will help shape the final product which is expected to be available through the Society in the Winter of 2009.
