In May, the NSCA partnered with other organizations to host a public lecture and a workshop in support of Caregivers Awareness Month. For the first time, we ventured to offer the lecture live over internet and to our delight it was a true success! In partnership with the Legal Information Society of Nova Scotia, the NSCA hosted a number of public information sessions presenting the new resource It's In Your Hands which provides information and resources for seniors and care

providers regarding legal affairs. We recently completed the Age-Friendly Community Implementation and Evaluation Guide which was developed to aid communities throughout Canada that are implementing an "age-friendly" initiative. This Guide is expected to be available in the fall.

We're delighted to be working with researchers from Dalhousie University, Saint Mary's University and the University of Prince Edward Island as well as decision makers from the continuing care sector to develop a proposal that will support research on examining change in our nursing homes in N.S.

In an effort to increase the Centre's profile, we have developed a new Communications Strategy which includes a refreshed design of our newsletter.

In May, NSCA supported Caregivers Awareness Month in Nova Scotia. Dr. Janice Keefe, Director, Nova Scotia Centre on Aging gave a public lecture entitled "Our Aging Society – Who Cares? A Nova Scotia Reality Check." The lecture was delivered in person to approximately 75 people and accessed by more than another 200 individuals via live streaming on the web. As well, NSCA organized a workshop for health care professionals which had them examine the realities of family and friend caregivers and consider implications for their respective practice. Seniors Legal Planning Information Kit



After much consultation and hard work, a new resource on legal issues (in English and French) was completed in April. Promotion and distribution of *It's in Your Hands: Legal Information for Seniors and their Families* has been occurring via province-wide information sessions since early May. Feedback from participants has been overwhelmingly positive. In addition to being available in print, *It's in Your Hands* is available on line at www.legalinfo.org

Projecting the Housing Needs of Aging Atlantic Canadians (ASHRA)

The project continues with its dissemination and knowledge transfer work. The research team led by Dr. Don Shiner expects to release the final report in the fall. NSCA is cochairing, with Department of Seniors, the Nova Scotia stakeholder group which formed as a result of the project. The group wishes to continue to meet after the project's completion to maintain momentum around the topic of seniors' housing.

Home Support Workers: HR Strategies to Meet Future Projected Chronic Care Needs of Older Persons in Canada

The evaluation of a federally-funded project examining the issues and strategies related to the recruitment and retention of home support workers is wrapping up this spring. The evaluation, being led by NSCA, is assessing the project's objectives related to enhanced opportunities for collaboration amongst stakeholders, and increased knowledge of human resource issues and possible strategies. The project involved the development of a background paper which outlined key issues and shared insights from other jurisdictions regarding strategies to address human resource recruitment and retention challenges of home support workers. The project held a series of consultations with practitioners and decision makers in Halifax, Toronto, Regina and Montreal to share and build upon this base information. The research team led by Dr. Janice Keefe expects to release the final report later this year.

Supporting Caregivers of Older Adults: Tools for Service Providers, Program Planners, Educators and Policy Makers

NSCA is a collaborator on a national project being led by Dr. Penny MacCourt (BC) and funded by HRSDC. The purpose is to increase support for Canadian families providing care to dependent older adults by enabling the development of a network of caregivers, seniors' service provider organizations, government departments, health care educators and research centres whose work affects caregivers; developing a Tool Kit for service providers; and developing a Caregiver Policy Lens. NSCA will be organizing consultations for the project this fall in Nova Scotia during which input on the Caregiver Tool Kit and Policy Lens will be collected.

What's Happening...New

Timing of the C.A.R.E Tool With Older Spousal Caregivers

Janice Keefe, Pamela Fancey, Nancy Guberman and Cathy Ward-Griffin have launched a new research project about caregiver assessment with funding from the CIHR Institute of Aging, the Canadian Nurses Foundation and the Parkinson Society of Canada. The research will examine the impacts of a caregiver assessment using the C.A.R.E. Tool for older spousal caregivers of a partner with cognitive impairment. It will also look at the learning experiences of nursing students as they work with older spousal caregivers in conducting these assessments. Another component is to identify factors that may influence the development of education about caregivers for health care professionals.

Building an Alliance for Research on Continuing Care in Nova Scotia

With funding from NSHRF, NSCA is leading the development of an application for research that will examine the impact of changes underway in our nursing homes on residents and their families. The alliance involves researchers from different disciplines and institutions, as well as representatives from government, not for profit and nursing homes. The team meets monthly via teleconference and had a day long in person meeting to work on concepts, measures and research questions.

TEER for CARE: Technology – Enabled Education for Recognizing Caregivers' Aspirations, Realities and Expectations

A team of researchers led by Dr. Janice Keefe has received funding from NSHRF to develop an e-learning version of the in-person training session they offer for health care professionals on the realities of family and friend caregivers and caregiver assessment using the C.A.R.E. Tool. The team obtained information from potential users on learning needs and preferred formats and recently met to explore e-learning options. They will be working with MSVU Distance Learning and Continuing Education department over the next few months to produce a draft version of the e-learning session.

Mount Saint Vincent University's Research Day was held on Feb. 10, 2010 and the Nova Scotia Centre on Aging had an opportunity to display its research to the Mount community and the general public. The Centre's display had two themes, "Building Capacity" and Knowledge Transfer".
