In the fall of 2007, students of African descent objected to an object displayed in an exhibition at Saint Mary's University Art Gallery. *Black Santa Coffee Pot* was one of 37 ceramic works by gay Acadian ceramist Leopold Foulem that quoted from historic ceramic traditions from many cultures and periods. The gallery declined to remove or censor the work, but posted a range of documents and hosted a public discussion about the concerns it raised. Director/Curator Robin Metcalfe will talk about the controversy and some of the issues involved when artists quote from a history of racist representations.
