One very special highlight this fall was meeting the Honourable Diane Ablonczy, the Minister of State for Seniors. The Minister was in Halifax as part of the National Seniors Council Roundtable and while here she was able to meet with local researchers and decision makers. Opportunities like these keep the Centre recognized as a leader in the field.

The positive response to the resource *It's in Your Hands* continues, and consistent with our strategic direction to provide education and training opportunities, in January we will offer an on line workshop on caregiving for health care professionals as a pilot project.

Although it's hard to believe, the NSCA's 20th Anniversary will be in 2012 and we are having preliminary discussions about ways to recognize this significant achievement. So stay tuned for more details.

Seniors Legal Planning Information Kit



Our work with the Legal Information Society of Nova Scotia continues. Response to *It's In Your Hands* and the information sessions has been so positive that funds from HRSDC and the NS Dept. of Seniors was obtained to support more Guides and information sessions. Well over 1000 copies of the Guide have been distributed and another 14 sessions are planned for November and December. Supporting Caregivers of Older Adults

This fall as part of a national project, NSCA organized consultations with service providers, educators, decision makers in Nova Scotia to obtain input on the development of a Caregiver Tool Kit for service providers and a Caregiver Policy Lens for policy makers and program planners. Similar consultations are being held in other regions to ensure the inclusion of a diversity of opinions and expertise on caregiver concerns and practices.

The information collected through this process will help shape the development of these practical support tools expected to be available in late 2011. As well, participants are benefiting from the exchange of information during these sessions and learning about new or existing networks.

TEER for CARE: Technology – Enabled Education for Recognizing Caregivers' Aspirations, Realities and Expectations

A pilot of an interactive on line workshop will take place in January and February with a group of health care professionals from throughout the region. The workshop is intended to assist health care professionals better understand the realities of family and friend caregivers and to critically assess their practice approach. The workshop is being facilitated by Nancy Guberman, Université du Québec à Montréal. Participants will be engaged through such on line technologies as Eluminate Live and Moodle offered through MSVU's Distance Learning and Continuing Education Department.

Both the experience of participants and the facilitator will be evaluated during the four-week pilot to understand the strengths and limitations of this technology-enabled learning opportunity.

Timing of the C.A.R.E Tool With Older Spousal Caregivers

This project is in full swing with 12 3rd-year nursing students from Dalhousie and UPEI trained to conduct assessments using the C.A.R.E. Tool with older caregivers supporting their spouse/partner at home living with cognitive impairment. A number of agencies and organizations in central Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island are assisting to recruit the caregivers. Several caregivers have contacted the project to discuss their participation and to date 10 caregivers have completed the assessment with a nurse trainee. Recruitment efforts will continue until spring of 2011 to achieve the project's goal of interviewing 100 caregivers. The research team is supported by an Advisory Committee comprised of organizations such as Veterans Affairs Canada, Public Health Agency of Canada, Continuing Care services, Alzheimer Societies, gerontological nurses associations and schools of nursing. What's Happening...New NSCA and Dept of Seniors Supports Evolution of Seniors' Housing Network

The Atlantic Seniors Housing Research Alliance has been a successful community-university research alliance taking place in Atlantic Canada since 2005 (www.ashra.ca). The project involved a survey, focus groups, case studies and a policy review to understand the needs and gaps in seniors housing. It also enabled stakeholder groups in each of the 4 provinces to meet regularly to dialogue on the project's results. The ASHRA project is winding down, but interest in dialogue on seniors housing issues continues. In October, the NSCA and Dept of Seniors co-chaired a meeting of NS stakeholders (e.g., government, private sector, voluntary organizations). The network's purpose is to support and advance housing for seniors through knowledge exchange and mutual learning. They discussed results from the ASHRA project, shared information on housing initiatives from their own organizations and discussed the future of the network. The group will meet again in the spring.

Age-Friendly Communities

NSCA is continuing to advance the age-friendly communities initiative that is growing momentum across the country. During the next year, the Centre will be working with the NS Department of Seniors to support several communities throughout Nova Scotia that are interested in implementing agefriendly initiatives. These communities have received funding from the Dept through its Age-Friendly Communities Grant program. The communities participating in this initiative are at different stages of planning, and therefore, the Centre will assist each community depending on their individual needs and capacities.
