## Stylistic Parallelism

Certain constituencies have already declared their preference for on-line options. Traditional methods are still the first choice of others.

It is not effective to backtrack. Apologizing or explaining doesn't help. Just do what you have to do and ignore the reaction.

There is nothing wrong with those examples. If, however, they were in parallel structure, the reader would be more likely to realize how closely they belong together.

## **Alternatives**

There are a number of alternatives for structuring the above sentences to indicate relationship.

- Certain constituencies have already declared their preference for on-line options; others still prefer traditional methods.
  - SENTENCES JOINED WITH A SEMI-COLON (not a comma!), WITH PARALLEL STRUCTURE IN EACH PART: both clauses now begin with the people/constituencies who have preferences.
- Certain constituencies have already declared their preference for on-line options; however, others
  still prefer traditional methods.
  - This is the SAME STRUCTURE as above, but with the adverb *however* inserted to make it obvious that there is a contrast between the two parts.
- Certain constituencies have already declared their preference for on-line options, but others still prefer traditional methods.
  - ANOTHER VERSION MAKING THE CONTRAST EXPLICIT. Notice that but, unlike however, is preceded by a comma, not a semi-colon.<sup>1</sup>
- It is not effective to backtrack, apologize or explain. Just do what you have to do and ignore the reaction.
- Never retract, never apologize, never explain get the thing done and let them howl. (Nellie McClung)
  - These comma splices are considered acceptable because each sentence is short, and because the style is less formal.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>1</sup> That's because *but* is a conjunction and *however* is an adverb. You can tell the difference because you can place an adverb in different places within a clause or sentence, while a conjunction can only begin one. Others, however, prefer traditional methods is just a correct as However, others prefer traditional methods. (In fact, many stylists think the first one preferable.) You can't, however, write Others, but, prefer traditional methods.
