



Questions you can ask yourself

- What skills have I gathered from past work and volunteer experiences, school assignments, travel and personal interests that I can apply to a new job?
- Can I relocate for work?
- Am I willing to take a position that initially pays less to gain experience for later?


- Does the job posting match up with the pace, work-life balance, workplace social time and focused work time, and level of responsibility I expect and am willing to grow for?

Elevator pitch

15-Minute Elevator Speech Method – The Muse website

A great exercise for being able to express what you do, why it matters, why/how you do it, what's next (immediate or future goals).





Job posting resources

Create a list of job posting platforms, visit their websites and socials, and sign up for alerts.

Consider researching the employer first so you can follow them and be notified as great jobs come along.


Job posting resources

Look for employers first

- Canada's Best Diversity Employers
- Canada's Top Employers for Young People
- The Career Directory (search by degree)
- Non-profit: <u>Impact Organizations of Nova Scotia</u> (advocate for community organizations view members, sector map, and job board). <u>Nova Scotia 211</u> (community service directory)

- Business: <u>Halifax Chamber of Commerce</u> <u>Member Directory</u>
- Professional associations and directories (research in your field) Examples: <u>Taste of</u> <u>Nova Scotia</u>, <u>Buy Local Nova Scotia</u>
- Public-facing websites (research in your field). Examples from events and tourism: <u>Events Nova Scotia</u>, <u>Discover Halifax</u>, Official Nova Scotia tourism website
