
## A Reflection:

## Mobilizing Data to Inform Early Childhood Policies in Nova Scotia

## Challenges

Lack of ability to link data

Getting government involvement to get data repositories off the ground

Transfer of data/lack of sharing agreements

Communication about what data is currently being collected and who has collected it

Collecting and sharing data before school-age

Standardizing data collection

## **Aspirations**

Atlantic provinces come together to decide what data to gather in terms of the early years

Learn from other provinces

Atlantic provinces have an opportunity to enhance data sharing

Identify "bright spots" in each province like NB data sharing and NS Beacon project

Beacon project has the potential to move NS forward with linkage and data sharing
