

Important Academic Vocabulary





1. Program – can be:

- -A Master's/Graduate degree
- -A Master's/Graduate diploma (TESOL)
- -A Master of Arts/Science (thesis route)
- -An Undergraduate degree
- -An Undergraduate diploma
- -An Undergraduate certificate

2. Courses vs Classes

- -Courses are subjects taken to meet program requirements (Ex. THTM 1101, COMM 2211, GAHN 6601, GCRD 6560)
- -Classes are the lecture components of your courses (Ex. M/W 10:30-11:45 a.m.)

3. Subject vs Program -

Subjects = topics that are studied within programs (Ex. History, Math, Curriculum Studies, TESOL)



4. A Major – Undergraduate

an area of focus in Bachelors of Arts, Science, Business. Between 8.0 - 10.0 units in BA & BSc. and 6.0 units for Business

5. A Minor – Undergraduate

a secondary area of focus in any undergraduate degree program comprised of 3.0 units. Minors are mandatory for some programs (BA and BSc Major programs) and optional for others

6. Master of Arts – a Master's/Graduate program that requires a thesis



- 7. Required Course This is a courses that you must take, specific Course Name and Number given (Ex: MATH 0027, NUTR 1010); mandatory, related to your program
- **8. Elective** this is a course in any subject/program/discipline; chosen in consultation with your Academic Advisor
- **9. Prerequisite** NOT VERY COMMON IN MASTERS DEGREES except MEd, this is a course that must be completed before you can register for another course
- **10. Asynchronous** is recorded and can be accessed anytime within the semesters it's being offered. Students must follow a course outline and the class is not live
- **11. Synchronous** is real time delivery of lecture but will also likely be recorded and the video may be available AFTER class
- **12. Multi-Mode Online** a combination of online synchronous classes and online asynchronous classes
- **13.** Multi-Access Classes a blend of on-campus classes and online classes
- **14. On Campus** is live, in the classroom with professor and classmates



Full-time vs Part-time

15. Units vs. Credits - these are the same thing, MSVU uses <u>units</u>

```
0.5 units = 1 MSVU course
1.0 units = 2 MSVU courses
```

Programs:

- Graduate programs: 5.0 units = 10 courses
- Bachelor's degree: 20.0 units = 40 courses
- Diploma: 12.0 units = 24 courses
- Certificate: 6.0 units = 12 courses

Fall + Winter Semester:

- 1.5 units 2.5 units (3 5 courses) per semester = **full-time status**
- .5 units 1.0 units (1 or 2 courses) per semester = part-time status



16. Academic Standing – at MSVU, to be in "good academic standing"

Graduate students:

- maintain an overall 3.0 GPA in all courses
- not have received a final grade of "C" in more than 1.0 units (2 courses) of coursework
- not have received a final grade of "F" or "F*" in an any course

** if a graduate student fails to maintain "good academic standing", they are in jeopardy of being removed from the program **

16. Academic Standing

<u>Undergraduate students</u>:

At MSVU, undergraduate student grades are reviewed annually in May, after 3.0 units completed, for academic progress.

- "good academic standing" maintain a Cumulative Grade Point Average
 (CGPA) of 1.7 or higher
- "academic probation" CGPA is between 1.0 1.699
- "academic suspension" CGPA is between 0 0.9 (suspension for 12 months)

To calculate your Cumulative Grade Point Average:


Letter grades have a numerical value called a Grade Point Value, which is used to calculate your Cumulative Grade Point Average.


