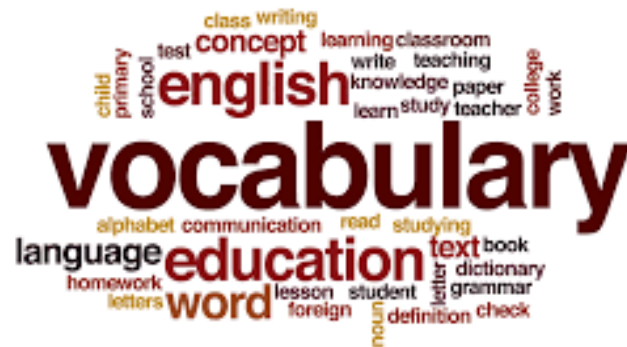

Section 1: Important Vocabulary



Vocabulary. Must learn.

1. Program – can be:

- A Masters/Graduate degree
- A Masters/Graduate diploma (TESOL)
- An Undergraduate degree
- An Undergraduate diploma
- An Undergraduate certificate

2. Courses vs Classes

- Courses are subjects taken to meet program requirements
(Ex. THTM 1101, COMM 2211, GAHN 6601, GCRD 6560)
- Classes are the lecture components of your courses
(Ex. M/W 10:30-11:45 a.m.)

3. Subject vs Program -

Subjects = topics that are studied within programs (Ex. History, Math, Curriculum Studies, TESOL)



Vocabulary. Must learn.

4. A Major – Undergraduate

an area of focus in Bachelors of Arts, Science, Business.
Between 8.0 - 10.0 units in BA & BSc. and 6.0 units for
Business

5. A Minor – Undergraduate

a secondary area of focus in any undergraduate degree
program comprised of 3.0 units. Minors are mandatory
for some programs (BA and BSc Major programs)
and optional for others

6. Master of Arts – a Master's/Graduate program that requires a thesis



Vocabulary. Must learn.

1. **Units vs. Credits** - These are the same thing, MSVU uses units
2. **Required Course** – This is a class that you must take; mandatory
3. **Elective** – This is a class in any subject/program/discipline; chosen in consultation with your Academic Advisor
4. **Prerequisite** – NOT VERY COMMON IN MASTERS DEGREES – except MEd
This is a class that must be completed before you can register for another class
5. **Asynchronous** is recorded and can be accessed anytime within the semesters its being offered. Students must follow a course outline and the class is not live
6. **Synchronous** is real time delivery of lecture but will also likely be recorded. Video may be available AFTER class
7. **On Campus** – is live, in the classroom with professor and classmates
***when choosing classes, the course listing will indicate Synchronous, Asynchronous, or a building name (Seton, Evaristus, McCain) and room number*



Full-time vs Part-time

- Minimum of 1.5 units or 3 courses per semester is **full-time**
- Maximum of 1.0 unit or 2 courses per semester is **part-time**
- Students taking our EAP program will be considered full-time
**If in-Canada, not permitted to work until you begin your program of study.*
- 0.5 unit = 1 course

Graduate programs: 5 units = 10 courses

Bachelor's degree: 20 units = 40 courses

Diploma: 12 units = 24 courses

Certificate: 6 units = 12 courses

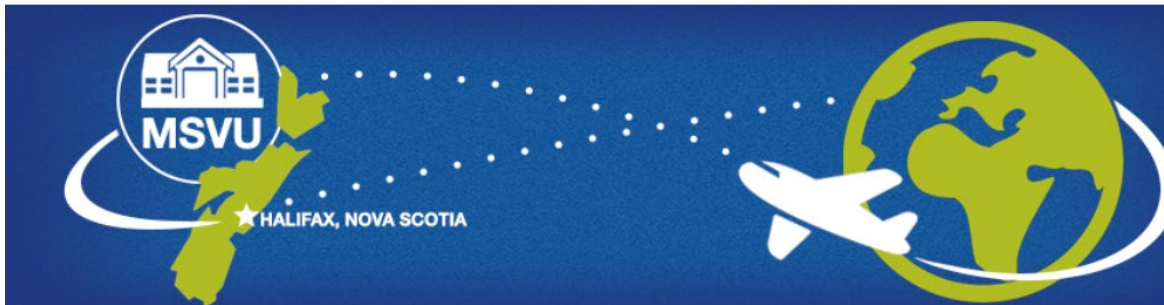



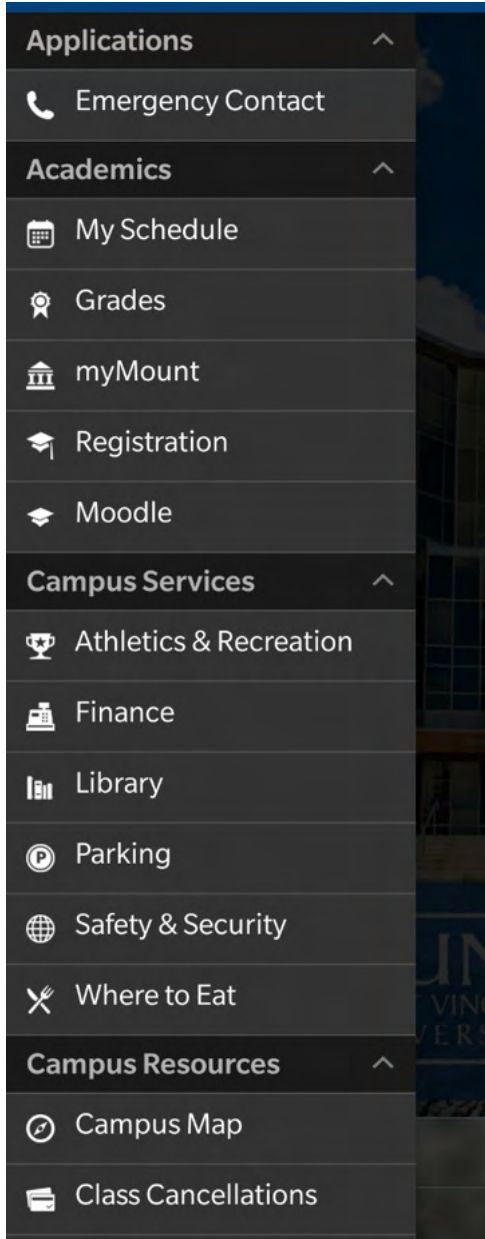

Nova Scotia University Student Bursary Program

For the 2021-22 academic year, all Nova Scotia students (as determined by a definition established by the province) will receive a reduction in their tuition of \$128.30 per course. This reduction, which will take the form of a bursary, will be applied using the same guidelines as for tuition. Supplemental Course Fees

Certain courses have extra fees associated with them. Occasionally, lab manuals and materials are prepared by the instructor for use in a course in lieu of an externally prepared text, and there is a fee for those materials. Please note that certain external (off-campus) courses and international courses have specialized fees.

Practica

Students participating in practica will be charged on the basis of the credit value of each practica. If the practica carries no credit value, the practica will be charged at the rate of one-half unit for each practica.

The most efficient payment process for an international student to pay their student fees from outside of Canada is through Western Union's GlobalPay for Students. This option allows you to pay your student fees in the currency of your choice which the converts into Canadian dollars.

Note: This is not a payment through Western Union Agent locations (except in the case of some payments from India). You will simply be paying a Western Union Bank account, and then Western Union transfers the funds to Mount Saint Vincent University in Canadian dollars.

Benefits of using GlobalPay for Students

- You make payment in the currency of your choice. This amount is then converted to Canadian dollars.
- The exchange rate quote is locked in for your payment for 72 hours after the quote is obtained.
- The exchange rate is very competitive when compared to your financial institution's retail rates, and bank service fees may be reduced since the wire transfer that you initiate is a local transfer.
- There are NO transaction charges from Western Union or Mount Saint Vincent University, though you may be charged a transaction fee by your bank.

Please include your reference information to ensure your payment reaches your Mount Saint Vincent University student account quickly, typically two to five business days after your bank initiates payment.
