[NEW] Basics: Introduction to Linux Wednesday May 18, 10:00am-11:30am, Online

This workshop is designed for those with no prior experience in working with a terminal interface. To access and use the ACENET and Digital Research Alliance of Canada HPC clusters from your desktop, you will use a text-based "command line" interface. You will use the command line to move data around and run calculations. In this session, learn how to get started with the command line and how to perform some basic tasks: create and navigate directories for your data; upload and download files; manage your storage; and run programs on the computing clusters. [NEW] Basics: Introduction to Shell Scripting *Thursday May 19, 10:00am-11:30am, Online*

This workshop is designed for both new and experienced users. You'll learn how to use the command line to carry out repetitive tasks, extract information from files quickly, combine commands in powerful ways, and capture a workflow so you can reuse it easily. Save time, reduce errors, and use Linux more effectively. Prerequisite: ACENET Basic Series Introduction to Linux, or previous experience with Linux. For more details and to register click here.

[NEW] Basics: Job Scheduling with Slurm Friday May 20, 10:00am-11:30am, Online

This workshop is designed for either new HPC users, or for experienced users either transitioning to Slurm or seeking to improve efficiency with the scheduler. The Digital Research Alliance of Canada's (Alliance) national systems use a job scheduler called "Slurm". In this session you will learn how Slurm works and how it allocates jobs, helping you to: minimize wait time by framing reasonable requests; ask for only the resources you need, to improve efficiency; increase throughput; run more jobs simultaneously; and troubleshoot and address crashes. Prerequisites: Completion of Introduction to Linux and Introduction to Shell Scripting, or prior experience with both.

[NEW] Parallel Computing School

Wednesday May 25 - Friday June 29, Varied, 1:00pm-3:00pm, Online

This course seeks to educate participants in common tools and techniques used in high-performance computing and scientific computation. Over 12 sessions in 6 weeks, we will cover general parallel computing, Dask, Machine Learning, OpenMP programming, GPU accelerator programming, and Message Passing Interface (MPI) programming. Each session will include a lecture and learning exercises. These will be oriented to those learners seeking a more advanced experience. There will be online office hours each week so participants can ask questions about the course content and exercises. Participants must have familiarity with the Unix command line, at the level expected after completion of the ACENET Basics Series, along with some programming experience.

[NEW] Notice of upcoming funding opportunities - Clinical Trials Fund

CIHR is pleased to provide this pre-announcement of the Clinical Trials Fund (CTF) in order to allow the research community time to prepare and respond to what will be an expedited process. This \$250 million funding opportunity over 3 years stems from 2021 Federal Budget announcements and in the first phase, is an integral component of Canada's Biomanufacturing and Life Sciences Strategy. In support of this, the CTF will provide funding through 3 specific vehicles: platforms with the development of a pan-Canadian Clinical Trials Consortium; people with the funding of training platforms; and, projects through the funding of a broad spectrum of clinical trial initiatives. Fighting Blindness Canada is launching the <u>Transformative Research Award (TRA)</u> program to fund strategic areas of need within vision research. The 2022/23

competition will fund innovative and ambitious research that will advance the development of new therapies for retinal degenerative diseases. This competition is open to discovery, translational or clinical research. The program is open to Canadian or international investigators, with a budget of up to \$1.25 million over five years per award.

[NEW] Discovery Horizons Call for Proposals

Discovery Horizons grants support investigator-initiated individual and team projects that broadly integrate or transcend disciplines to advance knowledge in the natural sciences and engineering (NSE). Full applications submitted to this NSERC program will be reviewed by a <u>tri-agency interdisciplinary peer review committee</u>.

In partnership with the Canadian Institutes of Health Research (CIHR) and the Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council (SSHRC), NSERC is piloting this interdisciplinary peer review mechanism. The shared peer review committee will assess all full applications submitted to NSERC's Discovery Horizons program, as well as relevant applications submitted to SSHRC's Insight Grants and CIHR's Project Grants programs.

In the context of this funding opportunity, the term "interdisciplinary" should be understood to fully encompass all research that connects, crosses or falls in between the traditional disciplines of the three agencies, including transdisciplinary, multidisciplinary, convergence research and other approaches at the interface. Discovery Horizons grants are expected to be valued from \$50K–\$100K per year and will be commensurate to the size of the research team. For this pilot year, NSERC is expecting to award approximately 10–20 grants.

[NEW] 2022 Exploration stream competition of the New Frontiers in Research Fund (NFRF)

The goal of the Exploration stream is to inspire high-risk, high-reward and interdisciplinary research. Exploration grants support research that pushes

boundaries into exciting new areas. Researchers are encouraged to think "outside of the box," undertake research that would defy current paradigms, and bring disciplines together in unexpected ways and from bold, innovative perspectives. With the Exploration stream, there is recognition that innovation often carries risk; proposals for high-risk research projects that have the potential to deliver game-changing impacts are strongly encouraged.

The maximum budget for the direct costs of the research project is \$100,000 per year, for up to two years.

Applications must be completed in full collaboration with the proposed host institution.

[NEW] NSERC Revised guidelines

NSERC is pleased to release the revised <u>Guidelines on assessment of contributions to research</u>, training and mentoring. The revised guidelines promote NSERC's support of research excellence in Canada and incorporate the Declaration on Research Assessment (DORA) principles by recognizing a broader range of contributions, including outreach and mentoring, and emphasizing their quality and impacts. The person applying for funding will now be able to select a broader variety of contributions and suitable indicators to demonstrate the impact of their work. Among other changes, the Guidelines provide examples of forms of contributions as well as quality and impact indicators. They also include updated language around interruptions to research, training and mentorship to reflect current NSERC practice.

Applicants to NSERC's funding opportunities should review these guidelines and consult the program instructions before applying.

No not Bedford Basin baleens, but phishing emails crafted to exploit our desire to please our leaders, bosses, and authority figures. Whaling is a scam where they impersonate someone you respect (the big fish) asking you to do a task, like buy a gift card, provide your cell number, or write a cheque. Recently, faculty received emails from "department chairs" requesting their cell number. Then, the scammers sent obnoxious texts demanding gift cards. The email address was from @icloud.com not @msvu.ca, so always check the message's actual email address when getting unexpected emails from your professor, chair, dean, or supervisor.
