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Dr. Ogochukwu Kelechi Onyeso is a Postdoctoral Fellow with the Long-Term Care Quality of Work Life in Atlantic Canada Project in the Department of Nursing & Health Sciences at the University of New Brunswick, Saint John, where he is affiliated with the Long-Term Care Research Simulation Lab. He holds a PhD in Population Studies in Health from the University of Lethbridge, a Master's degree in Orthopedics

and Sports Physiotherapy, and a Bachelor's degree in Medical Rehabilitation. Dr. Onyeso is a CAnD3 Fellow, a mixed-methods researcher, and a physiotherapist with over a decade of clinical experience.

In his current research with ARC LTC, he employs multilevel SEM analysis to investigate how the long-term care work environment, organizational characteristics, and contextual factors influence job satisfaction and job commitment, ultimately leading to "nurse innovation" – a latent construct defined by staff's capacity for problem-solving and improving practice procedures.

His prior research focuses on mobility and functional aging, long-term care, health administration and service delivery, as well as the structural and sociodemographic determinants of health. He has published more than 45 peer-reviewed articles and is committed to advancing evidence-informed, equitable, and culturally responsive approaches to ageing and health systems research in Canada and internationally.
