Writing Vocabulary: Use these key words to talk about your writing

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Paragraphs

Sentences that work together to organize your ideas into chunks

Paragraphs are a group of sentences set apart from others (usually with white space or indentation) that work together to support one main idea. They are like mini-essays that support your topic sentence the way a thesis statement supports the essay as a whole.

Thesis Statement

The main idea of your written assignment

The thesis statement provides a focus to your writing. It might make a claim, highlight a feature, provide a condition, or take a position on an issue (VanderMey, Meyers, Van Rys, & Sebranek, 2012).

Topic Sentence

The main idea of your paragraph

The topic sentence states the main point of the paragraph. It usually introduces the paragraph and describes its purpose or connection back to the rest of the writing assignment.

Transitions

The connecting words and phrases within and between your paragraphs

Transitions show how information in your writing assignment fits together. They show relationships between different parts and help the reader anticipate what will come next.

Introduction

The first statements that shape your first impression

Introductions set up your writing assignment. They state the main purpose or topic and often outline the main ideas your writing assignment will discuss. They tell your reader what they should expect in the rest of the paper.

Conclusion

The final statements that shape your last impression

Conclusions wrap up your paper and often restate the main point or summarize your main ideas. They state the main take-aways for the reader.
